MORGANTOWN—The new steel coal tipples of the Elkins Coal and Coke Company will be completed within the next 60 days. It will cost \$40,000. There are enough orders on hand to keep the plant running several months.

Pop Corn Balls.

Make some old-fashioned molasses candy and just before taking from the fire stir in enough popcorn to thicken it. After stirring the mixture for a minute set the kettle at the side of the stove, take the mixture from it by the large spoonful and lay each on greased paper or a greased tin.

As it hardens roll each spoonful into a ball, greasing the hands well first, and roll each ball over and over in freshly popped corn until this ceases to adhere to the surface. Wrap in waxed paper.—The December Delinquent.
