Roast Turkey With Chestnut Stuffing.

Wash the turkey out with cold water to which you have added a little soda. Neglect of this precaution often gives a strong taste to the stuffing. Make a chestnut dressing by boiling one quart of the large Italian or French chestnuts, shelling and peeling them and mashing them smooth. Rub into them a couple of tablespoons of butter, season to taste with salt and pepper and stuff the turkey with this as you would with any other dressing. When it is in the bird, sew up the body and tie the skin, covering the craw opening securely, so that the dressing will not ooze out. It is well to cover the breast of the fowl with slices of fat salt pork. Put into the pan, turn over it a cover or a pan, pour over it and around it a cup of boiling water, and roast fifteen minutes to the pound; baste several times with the gravy in the pan. For the cravy take out the turkey and keep it hot, while the liquid left in the pan you add a tablespoonful of browned flour wet up in a little cold water, salt and pepper to taste and the giblets which you have boiled separately. Stir all well together and if not of a good color add a little caramel or kitchen bouquet. Boil up for a minute and put into a gravy dish.—The December Delicater.
