EIGHTIETH DIVISION VETERANS DELAYED

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Sept. 2.—Late trains today delayed somewhat the arrival of large numbers of the Eightieth Division veterans for their annual reunion, but those who were here continued during the morning their plans for entertaining about 3,000 for the three day meeting. Early in the day about 250 members of the division's veterans association had registered at the local headquarters, these representing mainly men who had arrived yesterday or last night. Meantime a two section special train was speeding on its way from the East, bringing veterans from New York, Philadelphia and other eastern cities, as well as large numbers from Virginia, one of the states from which the Eightieth was originally drawn. Word was also received that the special train from Pittsburgh, bearing the Western Pennsylvania men and some of the West Virginia contingent, was about three hours late as were most of the regular trains. The morning was spent in registering, finding sleeping quarters, either in local hotels or at the homes of the many families in the city and its suburbs who had offered to care for some of the "boys," and in hunting up and exchanging greetings with old friends.
