

118 MINES DOWN TODAY BY SHORT SUPPLY OF CARS

Only 38 Per Cent Supply on Monongah Division This Morning. OFFICIALS HERE

Baltimore & Ohio Leaders Confer With Coal Men at Headquarters.

One hundred and eighteen mines are idle today on the Monongah Division B. & O., which is quite a contrast to yesterday when not a single mine was down because of car shortage.

Mines on the Charleston Division today secured a 20 per cent run of cars. They ordered 333 cars but received but a placement of 68.

Along the Connellsville Division there was a 71 per cent run of cars today there having been a placement of 64 empties.

Along the Monongahela there is a 25 per cent run of cars. The operators ordered 701 cars but the early morning placement was 179.

On seven of the nine divisions in Northern West Virginia today there was a 38 per cent run of coal cars.

In the Coke Belt mines on the Monongahela Railway in Pennsylvania on Monday secured 230 cars of coal.

Officials of the B. & O. system spent all morning and a portion of the afternoon conferring.
