## ABOUT TOWN.

Fresh oranges just received at John McGovern's.

The train came up from the Point at noon today, bringing passengers and mail from the steamer.

The schooner Mary Ann arrived at Point Isabel at 11 a. m., with a cargo of merchandise, from Corpus Christi.

Three wagon loads of pineapples from the Clossner sugar plantation in Hidalgo county, reached here at three o'clock this afternoon.

There will be plenty of supplies in town now, the steamer has come. The merchants will be very busy receiving and opening goods as soon as the steamer freight arrives.

The train which reached here at noon today returned to the Point at 1:30 and will be up on regular schedule time with the cargo of the Mary Ann, which consists of general merchandise.

The steamship Clinton arrived off the bar at Brazos Santiago this morning. She was not lighted today, and expects to come inside the bar tomorrow morning without lightening. She brings fifty cars of freight.

Solemn requiem mass for all departed souls was celebrated at the Catholic church this morning, with the usual solemn impressiveness of that service. The bells tolled continuously for several hours, while numerous worshippers knelt and offered their prayers for the souls of departed loved ones.

The cemetery was visited by a great many persons yesterday and today. The decorations on the graves included numerous elaborate designs in artificial flowers and tissue paper, while there were also many graves which were adorned with exquisite natural flowers. The artificial decorations suffered considerably in the rain last night.

The prisoners that were sentenced at the present term of district court were taken away this morning on the stage, en route to the penitentiary. Following are their names and sentences: Hilario Perez, two years; Jesus Mendosa, two years; Sebastian Flores, two years; Hipolito Sanchez, two years. Cecilio Amaya, a youth who was sentenced to three years in the state reformatory, also went with the prisoners, all being in charge of Frank Ayers of Alice.

## Sudden Death.

News was received here this morning of the death of Eben Cobb, formerly of Brownsville, which occurred suddenly yesterday morning at El Rancho, fifteen miles below Matamoros. He had not been sick, and his death was quite unexpected. Deceased was well known and respected in this place, which was his home for many years, and much regret is felt at his death. He was a brother of Samuel and Felipe Cobb, the unfortunate young men who were killed here on the day of the municipal election two years ago last spring. He leaves a wife, but no children.

This is Mr. Kingsbury's first visit to his old home, since he left with his family last summer to make their home in Cuero. He is very warmly welcomed by his old friends here. Mr. Kingsbury will remain here until the steamer sails, having come on the ship to look after her freight.

## Shooting at Yescas.

A shooting occurred yesterday at Las Yescas, about twenty four miles from town, in which two brothers, Enrique and Abraham Falco, were wounded. No particulars have yet been learned, except that the man who did the shooting escaped. It is not known whether the wounded men are seriously injured or not.

## BRIBE CHARGE MADE.

Arrest of a Commissioner and Candidate for Judge.

San Antonio, Tex., Oct. 29.—County Commissioner H. B. Sallaway, the central figure in one of the two county tickets and a candidate for county judge against Judge Robert B. Green, was today indicted by the grand jury and arrested charged with receiving a bribe and with misapplication of public funds; also for being interested in a contract with the county. Ben Dubinski, who is alleged to have given the bribe, was also indicted and arrested charged with giving a bribe and misapplication of public funds. The indictments charge that on May 18, 1899, Ben Dubinski, manager of the Dubinski electric company, paid Commissioner Sallaway a bribe aggregating \$250 to influence his (Sallaway) vote on a proposition to put in an electric elevator in the court house. The principal evidence in the case is furnished by the books of the Dubinski electric company, which is in bankruptcy. The grand jury investigation was brought about through the republication of facsimile of three pages of the Dubinski in the columns of the Daily Express.

## Earthquake in Caracas.

Caracas, Venezuela, Oct. 29.—At 4:16 a. m., today Caracas was visited by a severe earthquake. Fifteen persons were killed and many injured. Great damage was done to buildings, including the Pantheon and churches. The United States legation was badly damaged, but all the occupants escaped unhurt. President Castro, who leaped from a balcony on the second floor of the government house, had one of his legs broken. William Haggard had a narrow escape, the second floor of the British legation having fallen upon him and buried in the debris.

The city of Caracas, which has frequently suffered from earthquakes, was visited last July by a series of seismic disturbances doing great damage to property. There were seven terrific shocks in quick succession and the residents of the city were terror-stricken. President Castro and his family slept for several nights under tents in the Plaza Bolivar and all the churches and theaters were kept closed for a week.
