Hidalgo, Texas, Aug. 2.—Work is progressing finely at the Closner plantation, getting ready for his new sugar mill. The machinery is expected shortly. The cane crop is in excellent condition.

Work on the repairing and painting of the court house is progressing rapidly under Contractor M. Hanson.

The regular annual fair at Reynosa, Mexico, will begin on the 8th inst. Preparations are being made for it.

Many of our Mexican families have left with their families for the interior of the state to pick cotton.

The custom guards at Reynosa last week caught a skiff loaded with merchandise smuggled from this side. They fired at the smuggler, but he abandoned the boat and goods, making his escape to this side. No owners for the boat and goods have appeared.

County court will convene here on Monday the 15th instant.

Only three boarders remain at Hotel Closner now.

Cotton picking has commenced here.

Corn is retailing here at 40 cents an almond.

Martin Conde a prisoner arrested by Sheriff John Closner some three months ago, on various charges, made his escape from jail Saturday evening, 27, by attacking the jailor and beating him over the head with a piece of wood. The prisoner had come in with two buckets of water and went for more, and on his return attacked the jailor from behind, dealing him a terrible blow on the head which stunned him a little. A sharp tussle ensued, but the jailor was considerably used up. Conde is a fugitive from justice from Victoria, Mexico, having escaped from the penitentiary there. There is no clue to his whereabouts. The jailor lies at his home quite sick.

D. 1899, both years inclusive, or the owners of, or interested in, any property within the limits of said City, upon which any such Taxes for any of said years are due, are hereby notified that the Delinquent Tax Rolls for said years have been prepared by the City Assessor, and are now in the hands of said City Assessor, and of a Special Committee composed of Aldermen Benjamin Kowalski, Jose Celaya, Celedonio Garza and Valentin Gavito, duly appointed by the City Council of said City of Brownsville, and subject at all times, until the First, (1st), day of August, A. D. 1901, to the inspection and examination of any such persons interested therein, for the purpose of such inspection and examination.
