

ABOUT TOWN.

More rain fell last evening, and it looks as if there were still more coming.

The schooner Pierce Simpson sailed from Galveston for Point Isabel at 8 o'clock this morning.

All nature is glad, on account of the bonntiful rains which have blessed this section the last few days.

The children's hop which was to have occurred at the opera house yesterday afternoon was postponed on account of the rain until this afternoon.

The pilot boat went outside the bar this morning to bring the Beaham inside, but was unable to make it, and the big schooner is still outside the pass.

Albert T. Woodhouse arrived from Las Tresquitas, the Woodhouse ranch, today. He says very little rain has fallen at the ranch yet. Mrs. Woodhouse has gone to Laredo to visit relatives.

A little six-years-old girl, named Guadalupe Enkins, died suddenly yesterday afternoon. It seems that she was taken ill at school with a violent fit of coughing, which caused hemorrhage, resulting in her death shortly after. The funeral takes place this afternoon.

A recent cablegram received by Dr. Jos. K. Combe from his brother Major F. J. Combe, dated at Manila, states that the major will not be able to make his contemplated visit home at present, as he has been appointed as one of the surgeons on the Board of Health at Manila. "Doctor Fred's" home friends regret to lose the pleasure of seeing him soon, but are pleased to learn that he has received an appointment which is in the nature of a promotion in the service.

Extent of the Rain.

Reports by wire show that last night's rain extended as far as Rio Grande City, but none is reported at Roma or above that point.

At Roma a rise in the river of 5 or 6 feet is reported, but it was falling again this morning.
