Last Sunday officers were notified that Jose Corona was beating his mother, and accordingly Chief of Police George Connor, Sheriff Garza, Deputy Sotenes Saldaña and Joaquin Treviño went to the house. When the officers entered the house Corona attacked them and stabbed Saldaña in the breast with a bayonet, inflicting a slight wound. Corona had an examining trial before Judge Gavito this morning, and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of \$250, which he has so far failed to give and is in jail.

THE HERALD is informed by Mayor Combe that the city today purchased a carload of crude petroleum and will immediately begin oiling the city and suburbs under direction of the city physician. The city authorities will wage a fierce and unrelenting warfare on the festive mosquito, and that insect will positively have nowhere to lay his head or present his bill. The health of our community is better than it usually is at this season of the year, the mortality rate lower, and the authorities will make every effort to still decrease the death rate and increase the healthfulness of the city.

A pleasant call is acknowledged from W. S. Bingham, a cotton buyer from Brownwood. The gentleman comes down to look over this section regarding its adaptability to cotton raising and is firmly convinced from what he has seen and learned since arriving that

from a bale to a bale and quarter per acre can be raised here. Mr. Bingham will probably locate in this section. Cotton is a crop which commands money when other products are out of the way and would be the means of putting considerable of the circulating medium into the hands of those who would turn it loose again, and times would begin to have an upward tendency at once. There are few facilities for handling cotton at present but these would be a natural result of a large acreage. C. Lindsey, who accompanied Mr. Bingham on his rounds getting acquainted with the people this morning, says in the neighborhood of Olmito alone at least 1000 acres will be planted in cotton, and this would be a great inducement to the putting in of the proper machinery and other facilities for handling the crop. Other localities will no doubt do equally as well as Olmito, and the prospects are good for a large acreage of cotton another season. The boll weevil has gone farther north and it is not likely he will be any detriment to the proposed cotton crop.

Last Friday two diamond rings, a baby ring, a gold bracelet and a breast pin disappeared from the residence of Samuel Belden. The officers were notified and Chief of Police George Connor went to work in the matter. A ten-year-old girl employed as a servant in the Belden household was suspected of having had something to do with the disappearance of the jewelry, and Chief Connor succeeded in obtaining a confession from the girl, who said she had sold the articles to a woman named Catarina Silva for \$1.50, Mexican money. The woman in turn had sold them to a man for a small profit, and on finding the man the jewelry was recovered. The articles stolen were valued at between \$300 and 400, and Chief Connor deserves great credit for the prompt and efficient manner in which he handled the case.
