THAT ANTI-PASS LAW.

The special committee of the Texas Press Association appointed to inquire into the new anti-pass law in relation to the right of the railroad companies and newspapers to exchange transportation for advertising space, has advised the press fraternity to observe the law as if there were no question as to its constitutionality. This does not, however, imply that the committee has decided that the provision of the law prohibiting such exchange is constitutional, but merely that pending a final decision, that may be made only by a test in the courts, the newspapers should conform to the law.

There is a difference of opinion, the committee states, as to the power of the new law to set aside contracts already made between railroads and newspapers, or to prevent the completion of such contracts as are already partially completed. THE HERALD doubts the validity of a law which pretends to invalidate bona fide contracts entered into before the law was passed.

But, whether the new law is so far-reaching as that, it does not seem possible that anyone could contend that the new law would authorize a railroad to recall mileage already issued in payment for advertising space, when the publisher had carried out his contract, but had not yet used the transportation issued to him.

ENTHUSIASTIC OVER COUNTRY

Northern Capitalist Is Amazed at This Section.

Mr. Sims has been here several days and has been surveying the possibilities of this truly wonderful country from the hurricane deck of a Texas pony. To say that he is enthusiastic about its possibilities is putting it mildly.

"I do not hesitate to say," he remarked to a HERALD reporter, "that within the next five years this strip of the Rio Grande valley from Brownsville to Hidalgo will produce as much wealth as has ever been dug out of the mines of Colorado."

Mr. Sims came here with E. K. Palmer, the general eastern passenger agent of the Rock Island-Frisco system, and they have been seeing the country together, in company with Mr. Brackett.
