Story of A Stolen Car

Monday evening a negro came to Liberty driving an Overland automobile and stated that the car had been stolen from Memphis people by a couple of young white men, who had been arrested in Centerville, and that he was taking the car back to Memphis. He further said the prisoners dug out of the Centerville jail Sunday night and that he passed one of them, so he thought, on the way to Liberty, the young fellow wanting to ride with him.

Marshal Hughey started down the Centerville road and arrested a boy about 17, near Russ Van-normans, who acknowledge to being one of the culprits, saying his name was Ray Webb, and that the other, one Hamilton, who was older, stole the car and he only came with him. Hughey lodged his prisoner in jail and learned that Hamilton went toward Gillsburg, The Sheriff's office phoned to Osyka where Marshal Nixon arrested the man Tuesday morning.

It seem these fellows got stuck in the creek near Centerville and had to get help, and then offered to trade the car to a livery man for another and \$50.00. He got suspicious and had them arrested.

Tuesday morning "Webb" said his name was Clifford Walker, and about the time notice came of Hamilton arrest. Marshal Coon telephoned from Centerville that the Memphis parties were not going to prosecute and to release Walker or Webb. Just after that notice came from Osyka that while guarding their prisoner, until it could be ascertained if he was the right man, a freight came along, going north, and said "prisoner swung onto it and again escaped. We understand a \$50.00 reward was offered for the car, but the officers here was put to some expense and trouble and Marshal Coon says he is out about \$8.00, which ought to be paid. Deputy Butler says Hamilton right name must be "Finnegin," as he is "on agin, off agin and gone agin."
