Is your school one of the live ones? If so, get the program, change it to suit local conditions and give your people a pleasant and at the same time profitable celebration of Thanksgiving. The school is the natural civic center. Make it the fountain head for the best of everything in your Community.

The club work bears an important relation to the future prosperity and happiness of your people. "Grown in Mississippi" goes hand in hand with the club work. Bring the two together with the grown people of your neighborhood with the program suggested and good results will follow. Try it once anyway.

The teacher has an opportunity of earning the salary paid many times over by taking the lead in progressive matters. The active teachers that have done this in the past have been liberally rewarded by the public. Look over the ones best known to you and see how true is this statement.

State Superintendent Smith strayed just a bit outside the regular routine and took up the corn club work. He was worth to Holmes County and the entire State of Mississippi many times the salary paid.
