Registration Books Close Nov. 13—See That Your Name Is There.

The city election will be held on Tuesday, Dec. 3, and the primary, according to the new direct primary law, will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 19, two weeks before election. The registration books close on Wednesday, Nov. 19, twenty days before election. If you are not registered you cannot vote at the primary or at the election.

In the coming election there are to be elected a mayor, two councilmen and a treasurer, and if you want to have a say who shall be elected you want to see that your name is on the registration books.
