NEWS OF OLD TOWN

Will Build Sidewalk To Washington Ave.

Old town is waking up and she is going to remain awake from now on. She has thrown aside her slumber robe and is putting on her glad rags and is going to do things.

The first thing the giddy old girl will do that will be noticed is to build a sidewalk from the state line on Pine street to the main business street, then down the west side of that street to Brink's new hotel building, then east to the river. In addition to constructing the walk electric lights will be placed along the line of the walk, so that new town holdup artists will be recognized should they stray over that way.

John Furness circulated a subscription list on Wednesday for the improvement, and secured \$150 in pledges on the first day, thus assuring the construction of the walk. A list will be circulated in the new town for the purpose of continuing the walk from the state line to Judge Lusher's corner on Washington avenue.

The improvement is one that has been needed for years, and will be a great accommodation for passengers on the boats, as well as to the citizens of both towns.

The old town has several other things to attend to that will be looked after this winter and the coming spring.

Start Movement for Incorporation.

Interested parties in the old town of Newport, Idaho, are discussing the question of incorporating as a city. The state officials have been communicated with, and it is very likely that an election will be held in the near future to vote on the subject. The town is growing and the residents desire better protection against fire, want sidewalks, lights and other necessities. They also desire to have an officer in that part of the community who will regulate the roysterers who frequently come there and "smoke up" the town. It is thought that there are now about 200 voters in the district desired to be incorporated.

A meat market will be established on Main street as soon as a building can be constructed for that purpose.

Dr. Carlisle and family have removed to Priest River, where the doctor will do the sawbone act in the future.

Furness & Kellogg are installing an additional bar in their thirst emporium to facilitate the handling of bottled goods.

Neil Scott, Charles Norman and John Turnwalt went to the vicinity of Blue-slide on Monday for a week's hunting trip. Poor bear!

"Curly" Mace is getting to be an expert with a rowboat. He practices on the river every night and can cross in record time. He may get a job on the ferry as soon as he learns the ropes.

Wm. Vane is circulating a petition asking the county commissioners to refuse to grant any more saloon licenses for old town. It has not been generally signed.

Capt. Jim Stuart, of the Spokane, has been compelled to take a vacation. He is suffering with the rheumatism. Capt. Clarence Sample is handling the wheel while Stuart is absent.

And still they come. Two firms have made application for licenses for saloons, one to be located in the old Carlisle house and the other in a new building to be erected just north of Carl Brink's saloon and hotel. Must be an awful thirsty set over our way.

The Jurgens sawmill was closed down on Saturday for the purpose of making repairs which will probably take all week to complete. New furnaces are to be constructed, hollow blast grate bars to be installed, the slasher and slab conveyor lowered and several minor improvements to be made.

The Spirit Valley traction engine was used the fore part of the week to pull stumps in the new pole yard of the Appel Bros. It was a success as a stump puller and could be used in other portions of both towns to the great benefit of pedestrians, as well as improving the appearance of the property.

Wm. Geary has been appointed a justice of the peace. He formerly acted as constable. The latter office is now vacant. A gentleman from the south end of town will probably be appointed to fill the vacancy, as a petition is being circulated asking the proper authorities to appoint him. "Judge" Geary is now ready to tie the marriage knot tighter than it can be tied in Washington and to issue garnishees. The only kind of a legal paper that he cannot issue is a clearing house certificate.

Constable Nuzum, of old town, made his first arrest last night. On complaint of Ida McNeilly the constable arrested Jack McNeilly, the woman's husband. Jack was raising rough house down in the lower end of town when the constable pinched him. As there is no jail over there as yet the prisoner was locked up in a room at the Pacific Hotel overnight and will have his trial before "Judge" Geary Friday. This will also be the "judge's" first case since he was elevated to the bench.

Parties from Oregon have leased the hotel property owned by A. Peterson and recently vacated by Mrs. Dr. Carlisle. The newcomers will open a saloon in the property and also conduct a hotel and lodging house. The additional saloon is not looked upon with favor by the residents on account of the location.

Besides, it is considered that two saloons are ample to supply the stuff to quench the thirst of our residents. In addition it is not thought that the patronage of the town will support a third third parlor.

"It's getting awful darned hard for a lumberjack to live and have a good time over on the Idaho side of Newport" said a well known river rat Friday morning. Now one would suppose that that was enough but now they are talking of incorporating, so as to get rid of the rubber toungeed socialist who knows everything and is bound to tell it whether or no."
