**NEWS OF OLD TOWN**

**River Getting So Low That Navigation is Difficult.**

**Local Happenings of the Week.**

Jack Furness went to Spokane on Wednesday on a business trip.

M. H. Harvey, of Elk, called on acquaintances in Newport this week.

Dr. Carlisle, from Priest River, was visiting patients here on Tuesday.

The Kennedy mill at Dalkena has suspended logging operations for a short time.

The Jurgens mill started up again on Monday, after a week's shutdown for necessary repairs.

"Doc" Carter and wife, from everywhere, have been stopping in old town during the past week.

Fred Reed will open a boarding house near the Jurgens mill to accommodate the employees of that concern.

Mrs. Ed Hanchins has opened her restaurant and grocery in the building formerly occupied by the Evergreen saloon.

The new Brink building is about enclosed. It will probably be completed and ready for occupancy early in December.

Tom Geary and wife were called to Spokane Wednesday by the death of Mr. Geary's brother-in-law, Jack Johnson, of Bluebird.

The mulligan gang that has been infesting the river bank in old town has been broken up by residents of the north of the town.

Hugh Graham has resigned his position with the Fidelity Lumber Co., and has gone to Priest River to look after his mining interests.

Billy Heffner has been in the vicinity of Springdale for the past two weeks investigating some timber propositions for local capitalists.

Engineer Fleming, of the Blackwell road, with a crew of men, has been at work recently taking soundings on the river for the company.

George Edge, of Post Arthur, Manitoba, is the guest of his friend, Capt. Fred Kirkland. Mr. Edge is an architect and will probably remain in this locality.

Art Hanchins started to work for Appel Bros. on Wednesday skinning mules. He was so proficient at that class of work that he was promoted at noon to top loader.

Fred Kirkland and George Edge visited Spirit Lake on Thursday. If the conditions appear alluring to the gentlemen they may decide to engage in business in the new town as architects and contractors.

James Feeler and Clyde Avery, of Milan, visited with friends here on Sunday. Mr. Feeler proceeded to Priest River to look over some timber lands with a view to purchasing.

The exceedingly heavy fogs that have been hanging over the river during the past two weeks have seriously interfered with the rowing exercises of our champion oarsman, Curley Mace.

The steamer Defender will probably be docked for the winter season next week. The river is so low at the present time that it is nearly impossible to operate a boat that draws as much water as the Defender.

To listen to the rantings of an old Socialist over this way one would think that the country had gone to the demitition bow-wows, but most Americans think that the country will remain after the old man has cashed in.

Lumber for the new sidewalk to connect the old and new towns was ordered from Coulter & Button on Monday, and the probabilities are that the walk on the Idaho side will be completed by the end of the week.

A careless workman on the Pend d'Oreille Navigation Co.'s dock caused the loss of about 5000 feet of lumber belonging to Coulter & Button. The car had been switched from the barge to the transfer, but the hoisting cable had not been hooked to the car. The workman removed the block that braced the car on the rear and the transfer and its load shot down the incline and into the river. The transfer lodged on a bar opposite the Jurgens mill, while the lumber proceeded down the river.

The Metaline is having serious trouble in making her regular trips these days, on account of the exceeding heavy fogs that hang over the river. On Monday the boat was hung up and did not arrive until nearly Tuesday noon, so her Tuesday trip was abandoned. One night last week she arrived at Pend d'Oreille island at about 7 o'clock. The passengers were transferred by rowboats to the mainland, as the captain could not see to navigate the boat. It took three hours' time for the boat to make her dock, a distance of about a mile from the island. Capt. Le Clerc says that the fogs are the heaviest that he has ever seen on the river during his long experience.
