The voters of Sandpoint at a special election held Tuesday sat down hard on propositions to bond the town for a total of \$26,000. While there was a majority in two instances, the propositions were not carried, it requiring a two-thirds vote to carry the issue.

D. R. Morgan has entered the ice business, making the first delivery this week. Deliveries will be made on Tuesdays and Saturdays until warmer weather makes more frequent deliveries necessary. The Great Northern Railway Co., in a statement issued Monday, for the first 10 months of the fiscal year showed net operating revenue of \$21,612,524.85, as compared with \$17,764,191.39 for the corresponding period last year. This was despite an advance in operating expenses, which went from \$26,866,967.52 to \$31,086,899.11.

A. D. Faust, of Lakeview at the south end of Pend Oreille lake, was a Newport visitor today, bound to the lower river country. Mr. Faust is one of the pioneers of this country, having resided in this section over 20 years. About eight years ago he visited Newport, and is now agreeably surprised at the changes and improvements that have been brought about since his visit.

John LeFevre, who has a ranch in the foothills south of town, brought in the first strawberries of this section into town Monday, very fine specimens of the delicious fruit. He also brought in some samples of wheat about three feet high and barley about five feet, well headed out and indicative of a large yield. Mr. LeFevre is a newcomer in this section, but is rapidly improving his place and setting a pace for some of the old timers.

Secretary Allen, of the Bead Lake mine, accompanied by Mr. Porter, of Portland, visited the property this week. They have a force of four men at work, with about 25 feet to run on their 100-foot contract. They have not yet cut the ledge, but are confident of soon doing so. They are in over 2300 feet with a depth of over a thousand feet.

Dr. Boudwin has accepted a position in the Seattle City Hospital and later expects to take up a practice in that city. The people of Newport and vicinity sincerely regret the departure of Dr. Boudwin, as he has been an earnest, painstaking physician, but a large city location has appealed to him as presenting greater opportunities for advancement in his profession. Dr. Parker, of Seattle, who has had charge of Dr. Boudwin's practice the past two weeks, returns to Seattle tonight.

Dr. Wallace is a native of Kentucky and a graduate of the medical department of the University of that state. Later he took a postgraduate course in the Poly-Clinic of New York City, specializing in diseases of women and children and surgery. For two years he has been surgeon for the Milwaukee railroad at St. Maries and Tekoa and has also practiced in Spokane.

On Monday of this week Dr. Wallace was married at Coeur d'Alene to Miss Verna Starbird, daughter of W. D. Starbird, who formerly operated a sawmill at Chance, Idaho, and the Spirit Valley planing mill in Newport. She is known to many Newport people, who extend a cordial welcome to our city to the doctor and his bride.

"Lord" Russell Returns

Attempted Suicide

The bullet entered the left breast just above the heart and came out below the shoulder. Medical attendance was secured from Newport and on Monday afternoon the woman was taken to a Spokane hospital for treatment, with chances largely in favor of her recovery.

Mrs. Vossberg has been in poor health for some time, and only recently returned from Spokane, where she sought medical relief, but was compelled to return home without much improvement. Her mind has become affected by her illness, and the doctors having warned the family that she would have suicidal tendencies, it was thought all ammunition had been removed from the house, but in some manner she secured the cartridge and made the attempt.

At a meeting of stockholders of both institutions held at Priest River Monday a consolidation of the Priest River State Bank and the Citizens' State Bank, was effected.

The consolidation was effected by the withdrawal of most of the Newport stockholders in the two institutions, leaving the Citizens' State Bank, by which the institution will be known, practically all Priest River capital. The bank has a capitalization of \$10,000 and with the combined deposits of the two banks, starts out with \$42,000 on deposit.

Officers of the bank are: President, V. M. Smith; Vice President, C. W. Beardmore; Cashier, Lee Berry. These with R. Hageman, C. I. Mears and E. W. Harris, constitute the board of directors.
