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PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNTY DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE.

Rooms of Democratic Co. Com. Lexington, Aug. 13, 1872.

Purposed to adjournment, the Democratic Committee of Lafayette county, Mo., met in Lexington, Aug. 13th, 1872, and was held by the chairman, A. J. Hayes, Present, members, Steele, Gordon, Catron, Stillington, McChesney; absent, Platenburg, Wm. Corse presented credentials as a member of the committee. Minutes of last meeting read and adopted.

Committee McChesney reported the following names for Sals-Bar township to assist in the discharge of township committee duties, to-wit: R. H. Bledsoe, F. E. Murray, Esqr. Doty, G. D. Satterfield, Thos. Burnett, and Thomas Sewell.

On motion, it was resolved that the committee should be instructed to call a meeting of the several townships of Lafayette county to be held on Wednesday, September 25th, to elect delegates to the primary election to be held at Lexington, Saturday, September 28th, for the purpose of nominating county officers.

The following places of meeting in the several townships are suggested: Lexington township, at Court House in Lexington; Clay, at Wellington; and Green-Linn, Sals-Bar at Dade's School House; Free-Don, at Green-Linn; Washington, at Whaley's School House; Davis, at the School House near Mrs. Van Meter's.

The several townships are entitled to, to elect delegates to the primary election, to-wit: Clay, two delegates; Sals-Bar, two; Davis, five; Middleton, eight; Dover, eight; Washington, eight; Lexington, three; Freedom, four. In the township of Clay it is suggested that the delegates be elected at Wellington, and five at Green-Linn.

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: That delegates elected under this call shall be required to appear, before admission into the County Convention, with a certificate of election signed by the chairman and attested by the secretary, and also a list of the names of the voters of the township.

Resolved, That after mature deliberation on several occasions, this committee is of the opinion that it is expedient to call a meeting of the County Convention, to be held at Lexington, on the 18th of September, at 10 o'clock A. M.

A call was then made upon the chairman, who responded in a happy and patriotic speech of some thirty minutes, showing the true status of the liberal element in this county, upon the five towns of our district, and urged the delegates to look to the living present, and glorious future. The speaker was frequently interrupted by rounds of applause.

At the conclusion of the speech, the chairman proposed that the delegates be elected at Lexington, and the convention separated, the best feeling prevailing.
