All general debate on the army appropriation bill in congress closed yesterday. Filibustering by the republicans will now commence.

The ten dollar four per cent. government certificates of indebtedness are out. They will no doubt be a favorite investment for those persons who have heretofore patronized savings banks.

Last Saturday Capt. Lesueur introduced a petition, signed by citizens of Lafayette county, asking that the legislature memorialize congress to grant pensions to the surviving soldiers of the Mexican war. The petition was read and laid over until the rules.

The Burlington Hawkeyes states that the Burlington & Southwestern railroad will be extended by the managers of the C. B. & Q. Ry. Co., to Kansas City to give direct connection with the A. T. & S. F. road, and that full particulars will be made public.

The St. Louis democrats made a clean sweep at the city election, last Tuesday. All the democratic candidates for the city council were elected by fair majorities, considering the vote cast, notwithstanding the strenuous efforts of the republicans to prevent such a result.

Mrs. Laura D. Fair, the woman who shot and killed Mr. Crittenden in San Francisco, passing through Cincinnati Tuesday evening, en route to Lexington. The Nonpareil says she is "rather a promising woman, apparently about thirty-eight years of age, and a blonde."

Mrs. John Horne, of Anderson county, Ky., on Thursday night gave birth to five children. All are reported alive and doing well. She is 27 years old and has borne children twice before—the first time twins, and then triplets. The husband is a farmer in medium circumstances.

Senator Chandler, of Michigan, it is said, observed to a friend the other day that the republic is passing through its darkest hours; he had just come from the white house, and President Hayes would say definitely what he would do with the appropriation bills and the democratic riders.

Capt. Jas. B. Edes received a telegram, March 28th, from the jetties at the mouth of the Mississippi river, stating that Capt. Brown's official survey, just plotted, shows a twenty-five foot channel through the jetties with at least a width of four hundred and forty feet; a twenty-six feet channel with at least a width of one hundred and forty feet and a central channel twenty-seven and a half feet deep.

The negroes who have emigrated from the south this spring have been attracted by precisely the same motives which have induced thousands of laboring people from the east to emigrate to Kansas. Both the Republic and both classes of emigrants expect to better their condition by a change of location. This is the whole truth in a nutshell and building has no more to do with it in the one case than in the other.

The negro exodus continues from the northern part of Louisiana. It is estimated ten thousand negroes will have left that state before the time the emigration fever ends. A reduction of wages, owing to the low price of cotton, and inducements offered by railroad immigration agents are the main causes. There is nothing but little excitement from what has been designated as the bulldozed regions, which shows that the politics has little to do with the exodus.

Tom Park, of the Platte City landmark, has succumbed to the inevitable fate of all newspaper men who do an extensive credit business with their subscribers. He turned over his entire interest in the paper to his creditors last week, and in his valetudinary says that he will pay every cent he owes if his creditors will give him time to "collect." Tom has the sympathy of the entire newspaper fraternity in his loss. The paper will be continued under a different management.

We have been listening intently to hear the news which we expected as a matter of course from the Republic press over the hanging and burning of a negro at Fort Scott, very long since. Had such a thing happened in a democratic state, every republican paper would have been full of it until after the next presidential election. But because it was in "bleeding Kansas," and it has already passed from the memory of every "stairway."

J. Milton Turner, chairman of the committee to provide for the destitute negroes now arriving at St. Louis, en route for Kansas, calls upon the charitable disposed people of the state that the state for contributions, stating that the white and black people of that city have given liberally, but the burden is getting too heavy for them longer to bear.

We suggest that agents be immediately sent to Kansas to raise the necessary funds. That state will derive all the benefits of the exodus, and should be willing to come down quite handsomely

THE DEMOCRATIC GREENBACK PARTIES HAVE FORMED A COALITION IN CINCINNATI, FOR THE ELECTION OF CITY OFFICERS.

Springfield, Mo., last Tuesday elected a republican city clerk, through a coalition between the greenbackers and republicans.

The latest news from the south is to the effect that the migration out among the negroes is going on. The Court of Wechsberg, which arrived at St. Louis on the 2d, had only three families on board.

A Frankfort dispatch says Judge McManama has called a special term of the original court for the trial of Thomas Buford for the murder of Judge Elliott. It is set for Monday, April 23d. Governor McCree has ordered an election to be held May 12th to elect a successor of Judge Elliott.

There is another prospect of a settlement of the Tennessee debt, the senate having concurred in the house amendment to the bill to compromise the state debt at fifty cents, with four per cent interest. The proposition is to be submitted to the people for ratification if the bondholders accept the offer.

It is announced that English capitalists who are large ship-owners have been inspecting New Orleans recently with a view to establishing its advantages as a port for catching-shipping. They are said to have been so well satisfied with their examination that they are now on their way to St. Louis and Chicago to confer with those who are in the cattle business in these cities.

State Treasurer Gates' report for the quarter ending March 31st, shows a balance in the treasury at that date of \$1,315,697.10, of which amount \$957,659.90 is in the St. Louis Bank Company, \$286,187.80 in the Mastin Bank, Kansas City; \$8,045.25 in the National Bank of the State of Missouri, St. Louis; \$9,407.48 in the vault, and \$29,897.10 in other cash items, including \$49,000 in Clinton county bonds.

Two new suits have just been commenced in the United States District Court, at Kansas City, against Lafayette county, one founded upon \$3,000 bonds issued to the Louisiana and Missouri Railroad, and the other upon \$10,000 bonds issued to the Lexington, Lake and Gulf railroad for Washington township. The U. S. marshal was here and got service upon the county court last Wednesday. This does not look as though we were to have no further trouble about our township indebtedness.

It is presumed that these bondholders would not go to the expense of bringing these suits if they thought there was not the least chance of ever collecting judgment against the county. Those who think so now may hereafter find that they have badly deceived themselves.

JEFFERSON CITY LETTER.

JEFFERSON CITY, APRIL 5, 1879.

EDITOR INTELLIGENCER:—I do not like to open a letter with an apology. It is the fault of most correspondence that it begins so, and when it does, in nine cases out of ten, the letter stands in need of its first paragraph before its conclusion. But this has been a field day in the house on the penitentiary question, which was called up just after the adjournment of the Legislature.

The bill passed by the Legislature, which opened the debate, is somewhat inadvisable. The penitentiary committee is assigned the task of probing matters, being given powers in that direction which they did not possess before. A full, fair, candid and impartial investigation will be had.

Revision is moving along smoothly. The improvement resolution will probably be reported to-morrow.

The following very important bill, introduced by Mr. Bashaw, of Monroe, passed the house last Saturday, your representatives voting in the affirmative:

An act to establish a board of immigration and to provide for the general statistics of Missouri, and all acts amendatory thereto.

It is enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Missouri, as follows: Section 1. There is hereby established within this state a board of immigration.

Section 2. A board of immigration shall be composed of three members, to be known as "Commissioners of Immigration," who shall be appointed by the governor, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, and shall hold office for the term of four years from the first day of January, A. D. 1879, and until their successors have been appointed and qualified. Provided, that if any vacancy shall occur in said board of immigration, by the death, resignation or removal of any of said Commissioners, the governor may fill such vacancy in session, the governor may fill such vacancy or vacancies by appointment, and such appointments or appointments shall hold office for the balance of the term, until the next session.

Section 3. One of said Commissioners of Immigration shall be a resident of the city of St. Louis, one a resident of the city of St. Charles, and the other shall be a resident of some other city in this state.

Section 4. The board of immigration shall have power to make contracts with railroads, steamboat lines and other transportation companies, for securing a low rate of fare to immigrants, and to make the necessary arrangements for their reception and temporary accommodation.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the board of immigration to collect and compile all available sources, correct statistics and descriptions of the material resources and social condition of the state, and to publish the same, with maps of the state, essays and articles, correctly describing the advantages and inducements of agricultural and mineral resources and manufacturing interests of the state, and such other local information as may be of interest to immigrants.

Section 6.
