The Farmington Times in a notice of our publisher's arrival at that place en route for Poplar Bluff, propounds the query whether the object of his business is to seek a new location for the exercise of his journalistic abilities or connected with other business, and informs us that a new English paper is shortly to be published here. We will reply that his journey related to "other business." There may be sufficient opposition brought to bear, at some future period, against the FAIR PLAY to necessitate its suspension, but as we came here to stay it will require something more substantially solid than mere rumors to drive us out of our present roost in the Ste. Genevieve barn yard.

The Louisiana Crevasse.

The high stage of water in the Mississippi river has been productive of much suffering and loss to the people of Louisiana. It has broken through the levees, overflowed and destroyed many plantations and entailed want and hardship upon their proprietors. In Carroll parish there are twenty-seven plantations that will make no cotton at all, eleven that may make half a crop and twenty-nine that will probably make full crops. The Bennett, Carret and McCullen crevasse have driven the planters from their homes in St. James parish. The parishes of West Baton Rouge and Iberville are entirely under water, houses have been swept away, stock drowned, and everything of a perishable nature totally destroyed. The crevasse at Hickey's is ten feet deep and a quarter of a mile in extent, through which the water pours in an irresistible torrent, defying all attempts to check it.

Efforts are being made to procure relief for the unfortunate sufferers, which are meeting with marked success. President Grant authorized the Commissary General to send all rations of flour, meat, rice and beans that he could spare to the sufferers. The Secretary of War since ordered 500,000 rations of each issued at the rate of 20,000 rations per day, sufficient to supply 200,000 persons for twenty-five days. The New York City on Exchange forwarded five thousand dollars and St. Louis responded liberally to the call for aid. Through this liberal succor much immediate suffering will be averted but the inundation of the plantations will cause a failure of the crops and for a time retard the advancement of Louisiana's material prosperity just beginning to recuperate from the effects of the war and carpet bag rule.

The Indians of the White Earth reservation, Minnesota, have been turned over from the Congressionalists to the Episcopalians. San Bernardino county, Cal., boasts of a mushroom four feet in circumference, fourteen inches high, and weighing twenty pounds. James Snyder, aged eighty-four, and Mary Heslop, aged sixty-seven, were recently married in Turner, Ohio. The wedding was at the residence of the bride's grandson. In the Angus, Ga., cotton guessing pool, the lowest estimate is 3,918, 203 bales, and the highest, 4,410,397, the average being 4,178,383. There are only eight estimates below four millions.

A Colorado company imported a number of Chinamen to work in their mines at Middle Boulder. The residents held an indignation meeting, and forty masked men politely escorted the yellow men out of town. A little girl in Troy, New York, broke an arm from a china doll, and pushed it as far as she could into her ear. The surgeons have been unable thus far to get it out, as it fills the orifice so tightly that forceps cannot be used. Wooden shipbuilding in Maine bids fair to go ahead of iron shipbuilding in Pennsylvania. In the district of Portland thirty-three vessels, aggregating 24,000 tons, and to cost about \$1,500,000, are under contract for immediate construction. Bryant, the Tennessee murderer handed last Friday, seems to have been in an unusual serene frame of mind. He was not only sure of going to heaven, but kindly promised to pray for the unfortunates who were not permitted to accompany him. Hawke is the appropriate name of the individual who with others has succeeded in getting possession of the old Fort Kearney reservation, Nebraska. The act giving the land to Hawke and company ends a contest which has lasted for twenty-one years.

It is calculated that if the body of each of the 260,673 persons who died in the United States in 1870 was allowed a full-sized grave, the whole would occupy about 202 acres. If they were cremated the ashes would make excellent manure for about a thousand acres. While in the East the past season has been comparatively without snow, in Oregon the snow storms have been fearful. In Umatilla county the snow fell almost continuously from the first of December until March 9, with occasional thaws, which drenched the grass, and rendered the condition of the cattle deplorable. Of one band of sheep, numbering three thousand head, 2,000 died, and nearly all the stock in that section is dead or dying. Yet it is within a short distance of the far famed banana belt.

THE SUPREME COURT OF PENNSYLVANIA has ruled that a demand for payment of a note must be made at a reasonable time of day; if at a private residence, not at an hour when it may be presumed that the family is in bed; and if a place of business, within business hours. Eleven ladies started together for the railroad depot at North Adams, Mass. They were going to a woman's rights convention, and they marched along the sidewalk in a vigorous, determined way. The keepers of the saloons took them for crusaders, and put up the shutters until they had gone by. A California newspaper says that the State has never been more prosperous than at the present time. There is no inflation, lands are in demand for agricultural purposes, orchards are being planted, and vineyards made. In San Francisco buildings are going up, and so are prices, which is more than can be said of New York.

The movement against railroads in the West operates disastrously on certain industries in the East. The receipts of Western railroads have fallen off more than twenty-five per cent., and the result is that the corporations cannot afford to order the manufacture of rails. As a consequence orders are slack in the Troy mills, and some of them will probably close. Numbers of men who emigrated from the West to the gold mines of French Guiana are returning home. They say that the fields are about one hundred miles inland, and to reach them one hundred and fifty miles have to be traveled in row boats paddled by negroes, and after that a journey of five or six days' duration through dense undergrowth. Even the gold, which is found in rotten quartz, is in from two to six feet of black mud, whence rises an effluvia which no white man can endure. The water is so poisonous that the natives drink nothing but wine. The expedition was a failure.
