Senator George G. Vest will address the people of Ste. Genevieve County, at the court house on Saturday, November 1st.

The long agony will soon be over. Carl Schurz is confident Cleveland will be elected.

Indiana seems a little too set in her democracy this year to be bought at the polls.

Blaine Defends The Wrong Charge.

Why has not Mr. Blaine taken the same pains to answer the much more important charge against him as a public man which he has taken to refute a thirty-five year old slander against his relations to his wife?

Why has not Mr. Blaine repudiated the Madigan Circular charge as well as the charge against his private morality? A man who is so ready with defence, must have good reason for being dumb under such a charge.

Went Stay Whipped. The Ohio Democrats are like General Taylor in the battle of Augstura Santa Anna with a largely superior force had nearly surrounded him, and so planned his tactics that, as he claimed, the Americans were scientifically whipped.

The Ohio Democrats, too, refuse to stay whipped. The very figures of the late election show that a majority of the people of the state are with them, and they are now rallying with renewed spirit and courage for another advance on the enemy.

Republican State Convention. The convention met pursuant to call and organized by electing John J. Jeffrey of Boone county, permanent chairman, and Wm. P. Beach, of Macon county, permanent secretary.

For Governor—Odon Guitard, of Boone county. For Lieutenant-Governor—Theodore Bruere, of St. Charles county. For Secretary of State—X. C. Burch, of Cole county.

For Railroad Commissioner—Milton J. Turner, of St. Louis. The Republican Electors nominated at Sedalia were reinstated, viz:

- At large—Philip E. Thompson, of Atchison county; George W. Gaines, of Macon county. First District—Sidney G. Brook.

The Republicans of Missouri who refuse to bow down to the Fusion Baal, having met in State Convention at the city of Macon, Mo., this 7th day of October, 1884, do hereby promulgate the following enunciation of principles.

1. We believe the Chicago Republican convention of 1884 was controlled by a desire to advance to the presidency and vice-presidency of the nation citizens eminent in the civil and military achievements of the party.

2. We believe in the principles of the Republican party, and have confidence in their ability to win success in Missouri when earnestly advocated and honestly enforced; and we denounce and deprecate all dishonorable and disgraceful political alliances.

3. As Republicans, we repudiate and annulify all action of the late fusion convention, or of the fusion state committee, and especially all action pertaining to the nomination of a state ticket or to the substitution of Butler electors for the genuine Republican electors nominated at Sedalia; and we request all Republican voters to preserve the names of the Sedalia electors published with these proceedings, and diligently to substitute them for any Butler electors which will be inserted upon the spurious tickets to be distributed by the fusion committee of the state.

4. We believe the Republican party should be a temperance party, but not a prohibition party; and, to this end, we honor and encourage the noble womanhood of Missouri in their organized efforts to raise the standard of morality and temperance; but we deprecate any party movements in the direction of prohibition as calculated to arouse antagonism which will thwart the objects they wish to accomplish.

5. We believe the chief drawback to the growth and success of the Republican party in Missouri is the lack of honest conviction and noble purpose. For many years it has been largely controlled by intensely partisan spoilsmen who have been far more interested in controlling the official patronage of the Federal administration than in subserving the best interests of the party at home.

6. "With malice towards none, with charity for all," and firm in the faith of a successful future for the Republican party in Missouri, we present a state ticket composed of distinguished honorable and capable men for the suffrages of those Republicans who refuse to follow the recent fusion leaders down into the dark valley of humiliation where ignominious defeat awaits them.

None of the candidates nominated have been consulted, and some of them may be committed to the ill-fated policy of expediency. However, it is the privilege of this convention to nominate them, and it will be the glorious privilege of some Republicans to vote for them.
