MONDAY, Sept. 11, 1893. Pursuant to call of E. L. Dutton Presiding Justice, the County Court of Ste. Genevieve county met in special session at the Court House in Ste. Genevieve on Monday, September 11, 1893. Present:—Judges E. L. Dutton, J. E. Boyd and Clerk J. F. LeCompte.

Report of bridge commissioner on painting River aux Vases and Saline bridges approved and ordered filed. Accounts allowed: A. H. Chadwell, bridge commissioner, examining River aux Vases and Saline bridges and approaches, \$3. Louis Boyer and Bro., painting River aux Vases and Saline bridges and approaches, \$100. Gilbert Book Company, law books for Prosecuting Attorney's office, \$30.

Dramshop petition and license bond of Anton Roth approved and ordered filed and six months license granted. The court having been called for the special benefit of Anton Roth he is required to pay into the county treasury \$15 to defray the expenses incurred at this term.

TUESDAY, Sept. 12, 1893. For the purpose of meeting the inhabitants of said township and collect their taxes, the court instructs the collector to visit two places in each municipal township considered most central and designated as follows: Bloomsdale and Lawrenceton in Jackson township; A. Y. Doss and A. O. Babb's in Union; Avon and Louis Obuchon's in Saline; Staabtown and St. Mary's in Beauvais, and New Offenburg and Ste. Genevieve in Ste. Genevieve township. Court adjourned till court in course.

St. Mary News.

From the St. Mary Progress. Owing to the severe cold weather the past winter the crop in this locality was badly damaged. It is very scarce and what there is very poor in quality.

The services of Miss Belle Ziegler, of Ste. Genevieve, have been secured to teach the Parochial school in this place. She is a highly cultured lady and will doubtless make an efficient teacher.

The old priest's house, near the church, has had a new roof put on it recently, and is to be otherwise improved. The old roof was in very bad condition caused by the cyclone last spring, which blew the shingles off in many places.

We hear some of our citizens expressing fears that the water or river will leave St. Mary, so that steamboats cannot land at her wharf. It is gratifying to know that up to the present time we have better water in the chute from here to Chester than can be found at many points on the main river. The chances are that the River aux Vases and Saline creek will always keep a channel cut deep enough for the largest boats to pass through. Then, when we get our railroad, we will be "strictly in the push."

Major Brooks, assisted by Mr. Paul L. Lemcke, are re-surveying the old railroad grade from here to Farmington, taking measurements to find out the probable cost of repairing it and getting it in condition to receive the track. Mr. Honck intends pushing the matter, notwithstanding the stringent times, and after another twelve months' rests around, it need not surprise the citizens of this place to hear the shrill whistle of the iron horse. We should give him all the encouragement possible.
