STATE OF MISSOURI, August term, 1895. In the County Court of said County, on the 10th day of August, 1895, the following, amounting to a total of \$250,000, on the petition of H. C. Ziegler et al. for special road district.

On the petition filed August 2nd, 1895, of Henry C. Ziegler and others numbering more than fifty qualified voters who are resident taxpayers of the proposed special road district described as follows: "Begin at the most north-west corner of U. S. Survey No. 225, on Mississippi River, thence S. 46 degrees, W. 0.15 chains to East and West line dividing sections 8 and 17, Twp. 30, Range 9; thence West to S.
