FOR STATE'S RIGHTS

WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN CON- DEMNS CENTRALIZATION. Enlargement of the Powers of the Federal Government a Danger to the Nation—Great Corporations Behind It.

William Jennings Bryan and Senator Beveridge appear in a printed debate on the subject of state's rights, in the Reader Magazine. Mr. Bryan goes into a careful statement of the differing theories held by statesmen of the constitutional period and follows this with a discussion of issues of the day, in which these paragraphs are prominent:

"If the time has come for obliterating state lines and consolidating all authority, legislative, judicial and executive, at Washington, it can be done by constitutional amendment whenever three-fourths of the states are willing to ratify such an amendment. But is there any demand for a surrender by the states of the powers reserved to them? On the contrary, every reason which existed 118 years ago exists now, and those reasons are even stronger than they formerly were, because of the increase in the area and population of the nation.

"The demand for the enlargement of the powers of the federal government comes from two sources, viz., from those who believe with Hamilton in the theory of centralization, and from those who want legislation which the state's rights doctrine obstructs. Of these two classes the last is most influential, because the members of this class impart to their method the strength supplied by the object aimed at. An abstract theory seldom provokes discussion, but wars have been fought over a theory embodied in a concrete issue.

"First there is the effort to secure the national incorporation of railway and industrial enterprises. Those who desire this hope for an act of congress and a favorable court decision sustaining it. They could hardly hope for the adoption of an amendment to the constitution. The national incorporation of business enterprises is sought in order to avoid state courts and state regulation, but in view of the growing sentiment against monopolies the subject will hardly reach the courts, for it is not likely that a majority of congress can be brought to favor an enlargement of the power of commercial corporations.

"A systematic absorption of power by the federal government would not only cause discontent and weaken the attachment of the people for the movement, but a withdrawal of power from the state would breed indifference to public affairs—the forerunner of despotism.

"The exercise by the federal government of restraining power is not so objectionable as the exercise of creative power. "In the exercise of restraining power care should be taken to preserve to the states the exercise of concurrent authority, so that the state government, as well as the national government, can stand guard over the rights of the citizen.

"No assault upon the authority of contraction of the sphere of the state can be justified on the ground that it is necessary for the overthrow of monopolies. Federal remedies should supplement state remedies; they should not be substituted for state remedies.

Favoritism to Standard Oil Company. It is now claimed that by means of the proviso to section one of the railroad rate bill, the members of the Standard Oil trust are exempted from the operation of the law forbidding railroads to issue free passes. It was not so understood when the bill was under consideration, however. The proviso permits "the interchange of passes for the officers, agents, and employes of common carriers, and their families." Every corporation engaged in the transportation of oil by means of pipe lines is made a common carrier by the bill; and it is claimed that for this reason, the officers, agents and employes of such corporations and their families are among those to whom railroads may issue passes. There seems to be a difference, however, between issuing and interchanging passes. Yet the railroads will hardly discover that difference, if by ignoring it they can give rebates under the guise of interchange of passes.

It is gratifying to observe that our sales of merchandise to Latin-America have increased 30 per cent in five years—all without subsidies to the American merchant marine. In 1901 we sold Latin American \$116,475,999 worth of goods, but in 1906 our sales footed up \$218,977,990.

Philadelphia has returned like a dog to its vomit by electing a ring Republican mayor, by 40,000 majority. Philadelphia reformers evidently lack staying powers.

Held Up Trust. The real trust is now getting all powerful by eliminating competitors. The American Cereal company has been transferred to the Quaker Oats company. One Carl R. Gunter of New York made the trust pay him \$12,000 for 12 shares before he would allow the consolidation. This was four times the reputed value of the stock and shows that at least one man has been smart or fortunate enough to make money out of a trust.

One of the jokes discovered in the railroad rate bill is that Standard Oil people, their agents, employes and families are entitled to railroad passes just as one railroad is entitled to exchange passes with another railroad, as the pipe lines have been declared common carriers. The Republicans will have to explain why they were so persistent in defeating the Democratic amendment which would have prohibited this particular favor to the Standard Oil trust.

That eminent Republican Boss Cox of Cincinnati is an ardent standpatter, but somehow the voters seem determined to sit on him.
