# UPRISING IN HAYTI FEARED

SANGUINARY ENCOUNTER BETWEEN LOYAL FORCES AND INSURGENTS EXPECTED.

## THE TELEGRAPH LINES CUT

Gen. Simon, Revolutionist, Popular in South and Has a Large Following—Gunboats Patrol the Coast.

Port Au Prince, Hayti.—With most of the Haytian army mobilized and troops pouring into the province of Les Cayes from every side, news of a sanguinary encounter between the loyal forces under Gen. Celestin and Gen. Leconte and the insurgents under Gen. Antoine Simon is momentarily expected.

While the government officials declare that there is no real danger of the revolutionary movement becoming general and insular that Gen. Simon's forces are meager and poorly armed, those most cognizant of the situation fear the island is about to be again plunged into warfare.

The report that Gen. Faverolles and the loyal forces in the Les Cayes district have surrendered to Gen. Simon and that Les Cayes City is in the hands of the rebels.

All the telegraph lines have been cut by the revolutionaries and President Nord Alexis is depending on mountain couriers for news from the front.

Experts declare that Gen. Simon will have the backing of the entire population in the contest against the presidential control. Nord Alexis disposed him, according to the governmental officials, because he refused to come to this city to "confer" regarding conditions in the north. Simon's friends declare that the order to report here was for the purpose of getting him out of his province, in order that he might be arrested and shot as a conspirator.

Reports are current that exiles of the last ill-fated revolution, who took refuge in Jamaica and St. Thomas, are now endeavoring to land on the southern coast and join Gen. Simon. In order to prevent this the gunboats Nord Alexis, Verteere and Centenaire, with troops and munitions aboard, have been sent to patrol the coast.

## ONE KILLED; SEVERAL HURT.

Train Collision at Berwyn, Ill., Causes Merchandise Loss of \$25,000.

Chicago, Ill.—One man was killed, several men were injured and had narrow escapes from death and a carload of sheep was destroyed when two fast freight trains on the Illinois Central tracks crashed into each other at Berwyn, Ill., ten miles from Chicago early Saturday. The wreck caught fire and traffic was delayed for several hours.

It was a head-on collision between a Wisconsin Central and an Illinois Central train. The loss in rolling stock and merchandise will exceed \$25,000.

The dead, Arthur M., 34 years old, Milwaukee, Wis., freeman on the Wisconsin Central train.

The accident was due to the heavy fog that hung over the suburbs.

## RUSTIN RISKS UNDER ATTACK.

Mrs. Rice and C. E. Davis Figures in Omaha Mystery Again in Court.

Omaha, Neb.—Charles T. Davis and Mrs. Abbie C. Rice, the principal figures in the Rustin murder mystery, appeared again in the district court today for the hearing granted some time ago in the suit involving Dr. Rustin's life insurance.

The Fidelity & Casualty Company, in which Rustin carried \$5,000 life insurance, was recently granted its petition to perpetuate the testimony of Mrs. Rice and Davis. Mrs. Rice will have to answer 231 questions and Davis forty-eight regarding Dr. Rustin's movements prior to his death.

Mrs. Grace Rustin, the doctor's widow, will have an opportunity to file cross interrogations.

## Game Wardens Busy.

Carlyle, Ill.—The chief game warden of this county announces extraordinary efforts are being made to stop violations of the game law. Many sportsmen are now aiding the wardens by furnishing information. A number of prosecutions will occur at the next term of the county court. In addition to watching the hunters in the field, attention will also be given to the trains that pass through the county.

## Woman Fatally Burned.

Carlinville, Ill.—Mrs. Ben Hall of Girard, Ill., died Saturday from burns received Friday evening while burning leaves. The flames ignited her clothing and before aid reached her she was fatally burned.

## Illinoisan Killed by Indian.

Greenville, Ill.—Omar Scott, a son of J. N. Scott of this city, was killed by a Cherokee Indian in Warner, Okla. The news of the killing has just reached his father here. Details are lacking.

## Lemon Butter.



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
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# DOWN MISSOURI WAY

CANADA'S RESPECT FOR LAW AND ORDER THE SUBJECT FOR FAVORABLE COMMENT.

Those who have visited Canada are always impressed with the strict observance that is given to the laws of the country, and the order that is preserved everywhere. The editor of the Gazette, of Fulton, Nev., recently paid a visit to Western Canada. He was so impressed with the conditions that he saw everywhere, that on his return home he was inspired to write as follows: "Reverence and respect for law is a dominant characteristic of the Canadian people. Wherever one goes in Canada, whether east or west, the law is supreme. The law is obeyed because it is law, seemingly, and not because violation carries a penalty. Canada enforces the law and makes every law effective. No country is more free than Canada. In name Canada is a dependency of the British Crown. In fact, it is almost a third republic. All its taxes are voted, collected and expended by the Dominion and the provinces. The nominal head of the Government is the Governor General, appointed by the English Crown. Practically his only authority is to veto the acts of parliament, which he scarcely ever exercises. Canada gives nothing to the support of the English government or the English king. She gives England the advantage in trade regulations and tariff laws, and in return receives the protection of the British army and navy. Canada enjoys the protection without sharing in the expenses. "The sale of liquor is strictly regulated. None but hotel-keepers may obtain license to vend the stuff, and before a license can be secured an applicant must prove good character and provide twenty rooms in his tavern for the accommodation of guests. The bar-rooms close at 7 o'clock Saturday evening and remain closed until Monday morning. The schools and churches in Western Canada excite admiration. Though new, Western Canada is not so dense as the churches. Next come the school houses."

Turning to the wheat fields of Western Canada, the editor of the Laurel (Neb.) Advocate of Sept. 17th says: "I have often thought that the reason that the characters of Charles Dickens are so impressed upon the minds of his readers is because he dwells upon them so long and describes them so minutely that by the time one has waded through his long drawn out stories they are so burned into his brain that he can never forget them. It was this way with the Canadian wheat fields. Had we only seen a few the memory of them might have worn away in time, but a long drawn out experience such as we had is sure to leave an unfaceable impression. Never while we live shall we forget the Canadian wheat fields. They call it the granary of the British Empire, and we don't blame 'em. Nobody who has seen these wheat fields can wonder at their enthusiasm. It is worth while to record that these fields have now been harvested, and in many cases yields as high as forty and fifty bushels per acre have been marketed, while the general average has been above 20 bushels per acre. Oats and barley have also done well, and the profits, the prices of grains being high, have paid the entire cost of the farms of many a farmer. There is now 160 acres of land given away, in addition to the 150 acres that the homesteader may purchase at \$3.00 an acre. Particulars of this as well as the lowest railway rates will be given by the Canadian Government Agent."

The jury's verdict was that she shot in self defense. Miss McConov was a voluntary witness. Her story of the shooting was dramatic. Before she finished she was crying.

## Wm. E. Benson of Kansas City Dies.

Kansas City.—William Edgar Benson who has been an official of the board of education since 1880, and its secretary since January, 1891, died at his home in this city. He was 57 years old. Mr. Benson came to Kansas City from Chicago in 1869. In 1876 he was elected city clerk and held the office two terms.
