### Ste. Genevieve Taking New Interest in its High School.

E. M. Carter, Field and extension Worker, Cape Girardeau Normal, visited our school some weeks ago and collected the following data which appeared in the March number of the Missouri School Journal, the leading school paper in the State.

One of the Missouri high schools which has made excellent progress is the High School of Ste. Genevieve. This school shows an increase in the enrollment from 18 last year to 43 this year, or an increase of about 120 per cent. The people of Ste. Genevieve, under the leadership of the school board and the business men of the city, voted \$10,000 for an addition to the building. The vote stood 255 for and 27 against. The people feel that it is much less expensive and far more desirable to give their boys and girls a high school education at home than to send them away.

The cost of sending one boy to school for one year away from home would amount to \$200.00. This would mean that 40 students would spend \$8000.00 in attendance at school for one year, or \$32,000.00 during a full four-year high school course.

Three years of high school work are being done at this time and it is hoped that another year may be added next year. To do this it will be necessary to employ more teachers.

The \$10,000 voted for new buildings provided for three rooms suitable for classroom work, equipped with modern chair desks, electric lighted, and with new heating plant installed. The ground floor of the new addition serves as an auditorium and as a gymnasium. The music department has been established with a special music teacher in charge. A kindergarten department has also been established.

Two literary societies are maintained in the school. These societies last year donated \$87.00, secured from a play to a public library fund. This year they have placed two hundred books, several important magazines, and the county and St. Louis newspapers in the reading room. Two athletic clubs, one for boys and one for girls, offer to anyone of good character and from 12 to 21 years of age, an opportunity for physical development. The clubs are independent of the school, but use the school gymnasium as headquarters and permit the school the use of their equipment. Last summer a field was leased, a track was made, dressing rooms were erected from old lumber that was donated, and courts were built for volley ball, basket ball and tennis. A baseball diamond was kept up during the summer. The clubs have spent on work and equipment \$139.00 and have about \$50.00 in the treasury at present. All this has been secured through ice cream socials and club dues. Much of the labor was done by members after their regular day's work. They are placing movable equipment in the school gymnasium this winter and expect to meet the expense of the high school centennial at the Southeast Missouri meet to be held at Cape Girardeau, May 1914.

The eleventh grade work is being carried on this year for the first time and the recitations are being held from 6:50 to 9:30 in the evening, five evenings each week. The state course of study is being carefully followed and the class will be ready for the 12th grade next year. There will probably be 12 in the senior class.

The school is keeping a physical record of all pupils, after a medical examination has been made.

With the addition of two more high school teachers and some needed equipment it will be possible to place the High School at Ste. Genevieve on the first class list, so that its student may enter any of the state's higher institutions without examination. With the fine educational sentiment in Ste. Genevieve there seems to be no question but that the additional year of high school work will be added so that the school may be placed on the list of the four year high schools of the state.
