School Notes.

The girls in the Biology class prepared four Petri dishes with agar mixture (a culture which furnishes a sufficient medium for the growth of bacteria) and carried out an experiment on the best methods of cleaning rooms. One dish was placed in a room which was cleaned with a vacuum cleaner and after a given time developed about six or eight colonies of bacteria. A second dish was placed in a room which was cleaned with a carpet sweeper, this one developed twelve or fifteen colonies. A third in a room cleaned with wet paper and broom developed several hundred colonies. A fourth in a room cleaned with a dry broom developed several thousand colonies. This is a pretty good argument in favor of vacuum cleaner.

We have a Strain Pasteurizer in the laboratory this year. The same class in Biology have carried out a series of experiments on Pasteurization of milk.

The 7th and 8th and the 5th and 6th grades are preparing an entertainment to be given sometime in April. Everything is getting along fine. These young people are determined to make their entertainment the best of the year.

The 3rd and 4th grades have put out and pieced several quilts as part of their hand work. They are getting a training of the hands as well as of head.

Three or four bookkeeping students will complete their year's work within the next few weeks.
