Mrs. Hoffman was born in St. Mary's on February 13, 1860 and in 1880 was married to William Hoffman, who still survives her, also three daughters and one son, Mrs. Joseph Karst of St. Louis, Mrs. Hugo Reinold of Dallas, Texas, Sister Columbia of the order of the Precious Blood and Frank Hoffman, her aged parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jules Rozier, Sr., sister, Mrs. Menie Moore and brother, Jules Rozier, Jr., of St. Marys, sister, Mrs. George Bond, of Crystal City, brothers, Frank Rozier of Ste. Genevieve, and Sylvester of Farmington.

The remains were taken to St. Marys Monday evening and the funeral occurred from the Catholic Church in that city Tuesday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

Rev. Father D. S. Phelan, editor of the Western Watchman and pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, at 8333 Hall's Ferry road, died at 3:55 p. m. Tuesday at St. John's Hospital in St. Louis. As an editor, Father Phelan had a wide reputation as a brilliant writer and his editorials for the last 50 years were quoted in this country and abroad. He was born in Nova Scotia July 16, 1841, and came to St. Louis when a boy. He was ordained as a priest on May 20, 1863, at the old Cathedral in St. Louis. He remained at the Cathedral nearly two years as an assistant before he became rector. The funeral took place Friday morning from Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church. Interment at Calvary Cemetery.

To Clean Sewing Machine.

Sewing is not half as hard as some people find it if the sewing machine is kept in good order. When the sewing machine works hard and heavily take the needle and shuttle out and give every joint and bearing a generous bath of gasoline. Of course, there should not be a lighted lamp or fire of any kind in the room. Turn the wheels briskly for a few moments, to enable the gasoline to penetrate every part and to loosen and wash away the old oil and grime. Then clean it all away. When all the old oil and grime has been removed, oil with proper lubricating oil, running the machine for two or three minutes before inserting the needle. Now, with a piece of chamois skin wipe away all superfluous oil. It is a pleasure to sew on a machine treated in this manner.—Ex
