YANKEE TROOPS JOIN THE BRITISH

GIVEN ROUSING RECEPTION AFTER MARCHING ALL NIGHT TO THE LINE.

GERMANS BECOME DESPERATE

Five Wedge into Allied Lines but Are Unable to Break Through—Portuguese Also in the Front Trenches With Yankees.

American troops are now re-entrancing the British line in France, along the greater portion of which the Germans are keeping up their strong attacks with hordes of men and great concentrations of artillery in assaults that now apparently have their objective in the penetrating of the battle front in Northern France and Belgium. It was a happy lot of men that swung into the sector chosen for them and they were greeted with great enthusiasm.

From the south Ypres in Belgium to the region of La Bassee in France the new offensive of the Germans is being carried out with great desperation with thousands of men, under cover of unprecedented bombardment of the allied rear lines, endeavoring to pierce the bravely defended fronts held by the British and Portuguese—and now also at some unimportant point by Americans.

On several sectors of the new 25-mile battle line a few deep salients have been driven by the enemy, but in the process the Germans nowhere have been able to break through, the line merely bending back under the great pressure. Particularly deep are wedges northwest of Arrertruy and northwest of La Bassee—salients which seem to make certain the evacuation by the British of Arrertruy and to threaten seriously the important railroad junction of Behene.

GLASS IN THE FOOD AT CAMP

Fifty Persons at Officers' Training Headquarters Made Seriously Ill by Poisoning.

San Antonio, Tex.—Proof of the presence of ground glass in nine different articles of food shipped to the Nineteenth division commissary at Camp Travis was announced by Maj. Noel Gaines in Chicago, Nineteenth division military police, Nineteenth division. Fifty members of officers' families and enlisted men are, he said, ill.

Investigation of the presence of ground glass has been in progress. Maj. Gaines said, for several weeks. First efforts to locate the ground glass were futile, he declared, and persistent reports from the laboratory at the base hospital, Fort Sam Houston, to the effect that no glass was found in samples submitted led to investigation of the laboratory, where it was found one Austrian, two Germans and one Turk were among the chemists' assistants. Those men, he announced, had been "dealt with."

ROBBERS ROBBING ROBBERS

Gang of Bank Bandits Fall Out Over Spoils and Police Are Called to Settle Trouble.

Chicago—How one gang of bank robbers was robbed by a rival gang of robbers in a series of ploys which led to the arrest of four men were disclosed in confessions said to have been obtained from four of the five alleged automobile bandits who robbed the La Grange State bank on Dec. 15, 1917, of \$47,000.

The four under arrest are John Norvoney, George Strider, Max Kasper and Joseph Teshava. A fifth man is being sought.

According to the police, after the La Grange robbery another band of bandits obtained the names of the men concerned in the La Grange affair and, by representing themselves as police officers, obtained possession of the loot. The arrests resulted from the ploy and counter ploy which followed.

Senator Stone Stricken

Washington, D. C.—The condition of Senator William Stone of Missouri, who suffered a slight stroke of paralysis, is favorable. Dr. William M. Stetler, his physician, announced: Dr. Stetler said he could not hazard a prediction on his ultimate recovery, but was most hopeful.

Cincinnati—Max Buehlein, publisher of the Cincinnati Priet Press and the Cincinnati Abend Press, died at his residence here, at the age of 74 years.

San Francisco—California further extended its "dry" territory when the results of seven anti-liquor elections were announced. Five communities voted themselves dry.

Violator Ordered to Jail

Sedalia, Mo.—Arrested upon allegation that he had declared he would not comply with the daylight-saving law or other "lawless" government regulations, John Schall was convicted and sentenced to three months in jail and fined \$100.

Draft May Exclude Neutrals

Washington, D. C.—The House amended the draft law to exclude subjects of neutral countries who have declared their intention of leaving the United States. The measure goes to the senate.


