Hon. Chas. P. Damron For Congress.

The FAIR PLAY takes pleasure in announcing Hon. Chas. P. Damron, of Fredericktown, as a candidate for Congress in the 13th District subject to the Democratic primary.

Mr. Damron is 39 years of age, was born on a farm and resided on the farm until he was grown. He taught school, studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1902, and is now practicing law at Fredericktown.

Characteristic of his zeal and energy he will conduct an active campaign in all parts of the district and will see as many voters as possible between now and the primary. He is well and favorably known personally and by reputation to most of the voters of the district. He formerly resided in Iron County where he was elected to the office of Prosecuting Attorney for five terms and was elected once to represent that county in the legislature. Since his entrance into politics he has seemed to possess the winning habit, never having been beaten in the primaries nor in the general election, which success is attributable to his ability, sterling integrity, unswerving loyalty to his convictions, and fidelity to his party and friends. He is an untiring worker, a good campaigner and his activity never ceases from the time he enters a campaign until the ballots are counted.

Mr. Damron stands high in his profession as an honest and capable lawyer. He made a fine record as prosecuting attorney of Iron county and was recognized as one of the foremost leaders in the 48th General Assembly in which he served as Representative of Iron County.

Mr. Damron says that if he is nominated and elected it will be his policy and purpose to support the president in every war measure and to vigorously aid in winning the war, and that his vote, his work and his influence will always measure up one hundred per cent loyalty and Americanism.

The Fredericktown Democrat-News says of him: "Mr. Damron's time has largely been taken by war activities since the declaration of war. For a year he has been secretary and a member of the Local Registration Board and has handled the affairs of that difficult position to the satisfaction of all. He has also been chairman of the county Red Cross organization and the success of both drives has been largely due to his thorough organization and tireless energy. In ability he is equal to any man in the district and his reputation has not a spot on it. In vigorous Americanism no man can rank higher."

Mr. Damron is well worthy of the support of the Democratic voters of this district and we commend his candidacy to the serious consideration of every voter in the 13th Congressional District.

Edward Beauvais, died suddenly at his home near East St. Louis, Ill., Monday night, July 15, 1918, aged about 45 years. The deceased is survived by his wife and four children, and his aged mother, Mrs. Margaret Scott. Mrs. Jane Simino, Mrs. Albert Simino, Mrs. Louis Lux, Jr., Mrs. James Pinkley and Mrs. Weldon Pinkley of this city attended the funeral, which took place at Festus Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Delena Clark, nee Davis, aged 71 years old, a highly respected resident of Ste. Genevieve died at her home in this city Wednesday night at 11 o'clock, July 17, 1918, of paralysis. She was the mother of Sophie, Mrs. John Mitchell, of this city, who was at the bedside of her mother when the end came. The funeral took place from the Catholic Church Friday morning at 8 o'clock and the body was laid to rest in the Valle Spring Cemetery.

Dr. Joseph Jacob, one of Ste. Genevieve's most respected citizens, died at his home in this city Wednesday afternoon at 12:30 o'clock, July 17, 1918, after an illness of only a few days, aged 60 years, 11 months and 29 days. The deceased was born in Louisville, Ky., July 18, 1857, and was the son of the late Frank K. Jacob and Margaret Steelmeyer Jacob. He was married to Miss Theresa Wolk on September 14, 1880. The deceased leaves besides many friends and acquaintances, his wife, one son, two brothers, Frank Jacob of Ste. Genevieve, and Lawrence Jacob of Weingarten, and one sister, Mrs. George Siebert, of Glennon, Dunklin County, Mo. The funeral took place from the Catholic Church Friday morning at 9 o'clock and after a Requiem Mass the remains were laid to rest in the Valle Spring Cemetery.

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
