Death at 9:40 o'clock Friday morning, July 26, 1918, claimed Miss Martha Cecilia Moreau, the final summons coming at the home of her sister, Mrs. Maria Stanton, in Ste. Genevieve, after a few days illness, aged 74 years, 8 months and 4 days.

Miss Moreau was born in Ste. Genevieve November 22, 1843, and was the daughter of the late Joseph Moreau and Mary Elais Dolehand Moreau. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Maria Stanton, with whom she has always made her home. The deceased was a member of the local church choir, one might say, during her whole life, and one that rarely was absent from any church function that required her service. She was also a charter member of the Sodality of the Blessed Virgin Mary, established here in 1863, and was, during many years its most efficient and painstaking priestess. She was a type of a true Christian lady whose life was edifying and whose death beautiful and holy. The funeral services were held from the Catholic Church Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock and were conducted by Rev. Father C. L. van Tourenhout, after which the body was laid to rest in the Valle Spring Cemetery.

The remains of Mrs. Mary Koehler, nee Kern, widow of the late Herman Koehler, who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Roy Hicks, in St. Louis Monday, July 29, 1918, arrived here Wednesday morning at 10:30 o'clock and was taken to the Catholic Church where the funeral services were held after which the body was laid to rest in the Valle Spring Cemetery. The deceased was a daughter of the late John D. Kern and Regina Kern of Ste. Genevieve. She was 78 years old, and was well known here, having lived in Ste. Genevieve until about 15 years ago. Her husband preceded her to the grave seven years ago. She is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Roy Hicks, and 4 grand children, and many relatives and friends who will learn of her death with genuine sorrow. Roy Hicks, wife and daughter, Miss Dorothy, Mrs. Pauline Koehler, Mrs. Nancy Kern and daughter, Miss Agnes accompanied the remains to Ste. Genevieve.

The funeral of Placide de Hault Delessus, descendant of the late Spanish Governor of Louisiana, was held from St. Mark's Catholic Church in St. Louis, Monday morning, July 29, Mr. Delessus, although a resident of St. Louis for some time past, was little known here, because of a somewhat secluded existence. His ancestry, which can be traced back to the Fifteenth Century, was distinguished in both military and civil life, one of his family being Auditor of Accounts in the court of Mary Stuart, Queen of Scotland. The first of the family to migrate to America was the great-grandfather of the deceased, who was founder and later commandant of the post of Nouvelle Bourbon, near Ste. Genevieve, Mo. He was later joined by his wife and daughter, Odile, who became the wife of Pierre Debiguy, Governor of the State of Louisiana. Descendants of this union are now living in this State, the deceased being the second son of Col. Charles Delessus, last Governor of Upper Louisiana, before it became the property of the United States in 1804. After the transfer of Louisiana to this country, Col. Delessus made his home for a time in St. Louis, and became an American citizen. The deceased was born in New Orleans, on June 28, 1839. He was married in St. Louis on August 7, 1868, to Miss Marie Felicite Clark, daughter of the late Henry L. Clark, and niece of the late Senator Boggs. His widow and one son, Clark Delessus, survive him.—The St. Louis Republic.

Mrs. Zelma Cabasch, nee Grass, wife of Herman Cabasch, died at her home near Leslie, Mo., Friday, July 26, 1918, aged 23 years, 5 months and 22 days. The deceased was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Grass, of Lawrenceton, who were present at her bed side when she died. Besides her parents she is survived by her husband, two small children, August and Kate, one brother, William, and two sisters, Dora and Mary Grass. The funeral was held from the Catholic Church at Leslie, Mo., Sunday afternoon.

Entered into rest, on Thursday, July 25, 1918, at 1:50 p. m., at her home in Ste. Louis, Mo., Mrs. Lulu M. Aselhoff, nee Bell, beloved wife of William J. Aselhoff, dear mother of Margaret and Ruth Aselhoff, and sister of Chester Bell, Mrs. Andrew C. Herter and Mrs. H. W. Palmer. Funeral took place from residence, 4637 St. Louis avenue, Monday morning to the Holy Ghost Catholic Church, thence to Calvary Cemetery.

Pierre A. Janis, husband of Mrs. Madeline Guitard Janis, and beloved son of Adolph A. and Emilie C. Janis, of St. Louis, Mo., died suddenly at Charleston, W. Va., Wednesday, July 10, 1918.

Cut Out and Save

How to Wean Baby Successfully

Never Wean Your Child During the Hot Summer Months

Try to nurse baby all summer. Even part mother's milk may save his life. Ten bottle-fed babies die to one that is breast fed.

At nine months, give one bottle of cow's milk to replace one breast feeding. The proper proportions are:

6 oz. milk, 2 oz. water, 1 level teaspoonful sugar.

After two weeks, replace another breast feeding with cow's milk of the same proportions.

Wait two weeks and replace a third feeding. Keep on nursing the other two feedings for a month and then wean entirely.

If the mother has plenty of milk up to eleven months, it is not necessary to give a bottle at all.

At eleven months a child can drink milk from a cup. As the child learns to eat more, a drink of milk with his cereal can be substituted for a breast feeding, and he can gradually be weaned, without use of a bottle.

Boil all milk (and chill rapidly) all hot months. All milk should be kept on ice. If the baby is constipated, don't give him medicine. Use a soap stick suppository. Medicine upsets his stomach.

To keep well, a child's bowels should move once a day. Time spent training baby to a regular hour will save many a doctor's bill.
