DRY AMENDMENT'S EFFECT ON TRADE

WILL PUT 116,000 RETAILERS OUT OF RUNNING AND 922 BREWERS.

PLANNING FOR A DRY WORLD

Ten Other States Expected to Ratify—Liquor Question to Be Taken from Politics—Crime and Courts to Decrease.

New York—The effect of the ratification of the federal prohibition measure by the required majority of states is shown in the following figures: Will put out of business if they are then operating, 116,000 retail liquor dealers.

Upset capital invested in the brewing and liquor business to the extent of \$1,249,000,000.

Wipe out 233 distilleries and 992 breweries.

Throw out of work temporarily 749,418 employes, drawing annual compensation to the amount of \$453,872,553.

Remove the liquor question from national, city and state politics.

Expected to do away with arrests by 60 per cent, with a consequent reduction in the cost of operating courts, police departments and jails.

Affirmative action is looked for in ten more states before the wave has passed. Some of these states are already dry under local option laws.

The prohibition forces are now in Chicago and are planning a campaign to prohibit the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors in every country in the world.

Under the terms of the amendment the manufacture, sale or importation of intoxicating liquors must cease one year after the ratification of the measure, unless restricted by local laws.

HAINES FAVORS BARGE LINE

NEW RAIL DIRECTOR WILL HELP WATERWAYS.

McAdoo's Successor Believes That All Big Rivers Should Be Used to Solve Transportation.

Washington—Walker D. Hines, the new Director General of Railroads, in an interview expressed himself as heartily in sympathy with the Mississippi River Federal Trade barge line.

He said that he had favored the establishment of the line and believed now as he did then that it should be given a complete and fair test. He recommended the appointment of M. H. Sanders as Federal Manager, he said, because he knew Sanders' heart was in the task and he thought that under his auspices the barge line would be given every opportunity to develop.

"I believe," said Director General Hines, "that where a great natural waterway like the Mississippi is available, it should be used if possible."

Hines was not prepared to commit himself to any legislative program beyond that now being urged by the Railroad Administration that Government control of the railroads be permitted to continue for a sufficient time to afford a fair test of unified operation of railroads and waterways.

He strongly favored the continuance of the Government barge line and believed that steps should be taken to assure it a thorough test, but like former Director General McAdoo, he fears the experiment would suffer if the railroads should soon be turned back to their private owners.

FOOD TO THE HELPLESS ONES

British Army Sends Supplies to Vienna as They Treated War Prisoners Humanely.

Vienna—A small body of British troops have arrived here conveying a trainload of foodstuffs, a present from the British army in Italy to the women and children of Vienna.

The British officer in command explained to the burgomasters that the supplies were sent in recognition of the fact that Austria had treated her British prisoners with consideration, in contrast to the inhuman treatment accorded them by the Germans.

Three additional trainloads are to follow the first, to alleviate the needs of the women and children.

The burgomaster told the command that the food had arrived at an opportune time, as Vienna did not have enough flour to last more than the next four days.

WEARY OF ROUTINE

Eternal Protest Against Sameness of Things.

Act of Man Who Died Rather Than Submit to the Wearisome Commonplaceness of Life Causes Interesting Comment.

A newspaper item reports the suicide of a man who declared that he was tired of everlastingly lacing his shoes and then unlacing them again. Pretty enough the act appears in the grip of the day's news, but the report of it (be it fact or fiction) lingers in the mind till against a larger background of time it begins to take on significance, even to find a place beside immortal acts of legend and familiar attitudes of art. Here was a man who found the master knot of his fate in his shoe lacing.

Was he a fool or a hero? Alexander has fame for an act which as a symbol might resolve the blow of the sword through the Gordian knot, which disposes of the difficulty without solving the problem. For himself the suicide had dismissed routine with a suave gesture and with superb finality, but he leaves mankind in the attitude of Laocoon, agonizingly entangled in shoe lacing, the serpent routine, huge, insensate, unrelaxing. In its grip man writhes forever, hopeless of escape. To this group the suicide waves a jaunty farewell—"The best of luck to you," he says. "I'm out of it, anyway!"

Whatever our scorn for him, we must admit that he voices unmistakably the eternal human protest against routine; that it is really only in the suavity of his gesture and the supremacy of the rejection that he goes beyond the rest of us. The feeling that commanded his act is nearly the most universal of human impulses. We all rebel bitterly in the days when heaven lies about us, and the later shades of the prison house are nothing more than the creeping paralysis of hopeless submission. Only those of us who have trodden the mill so long that we are almost irremediably subdued to what we work in prefer, in such times as these when we have the choice, counters and ledgers to trenches and barbed wire. The lad who with a whoop of joy flings behind him his columns of figures or vaults the counter in his eagerness to rush into poison gas and machine-gun fire, though his gesture is one of bravery rather than suavity, is that of Alan Breck, rather than of Beau Brummel, makes his rejection of routine no whit less final than does the hero of the newspaper item. And he is not the one in a million who makes the National Army.—Robert P. Utter in Harper's Magazine.

Canada as a Nation Builder.
