Her death will be learned with genuine sorrow here by her many relatives and friends. Mrs. Sutter was a modest, unassuming lady of a gentle loving disposition, endearing herself to all who knew her. She was a kind wife and an affectionate mother, always interested in the welfare of her family and community. The funeral occurred from the Catholic Church at Salisbury Monday morning at 9 o'clock and after a Requiem Mass the body was laid to rest in the Catholic Cemetery. Mr. and Mrs. Valentine Seitz, Mrs. M. E. Kern and Charles Naumann of this city, attended the funeral.



She also leaves a brother, Conrad Muehlhaeusler, of East St. Louis and a sister, Mary, Mrs. Ernest Bader, of Minnesota. The deceased formerly lived in Ste. Genevieve County, and had a wide circle of friends, who will learn of her death with genuine sorrow. The funeral was held from the Catholic Church Monday Morning, after which the body was laid to rest in the DeSoto Catholic Cemetery. Mr. and Mrs. August Streible, Mrs. George Kreidler and Charles Bahr attended the funeral.

Jules C. Drury died at 7:20 Saturday morning, April 24, 1920, at his home at 109 North Lorimer street, Cape Girardeau, Mo., after an illness of several weeks with stomach trouble. Mr. Drury has been in failing health for the past year. He has been a resident of Cape Girardeau for several years. Mr. Drury's life was passed in useful and honest toil. He reared a large family and ably discharged his duties as a good citizen. He had lived in Southeast Missouri for the past 27 years, coming here in 1892 from Bloomsdale, Ste. Genevieve county, where he was born on July 14, 1849.

Born on a farm Mr. Drury became a farmer and continued in this calling until a few years before he left Bloomsdale, when he embarked in the mercantile business at that place. He traded this business for a 400 acre farm near Kelso and moved there in 1892. After he had lived on the Kelso farm for several years he traded it for a store in Kelso. Later he traded this store in on a deal for a large tract of land in Arkansas. Before he could develop this land and redeem the outstanding obligations incurred in the trade he was caught by the 1917 panic and suffered serious financial loss. Mr. Drury is survived by his

wife, who was Miss Mary J. Hipes, and whom he married in Bloomsdale in 1870, and nine children as follows: Amos R. Drury, Benton; Mrs. L. J. Danne Mueller of Kelso, Landra J. Drury of Kelso, Moses B. Drury of St. Louis, Mrs. Frank Clarkson of Charleston, Eugene Drury of Kelso, Mrs. Charles Hunter of Farnfelt, Mrs. Charles Fink of Illinois, and Miss Gussie Drury who lives at home. One child, Peter, died when nine years of age. The funeral took place at the Catholic Church at Kelso Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock and interment took place at the St. Augustine cemetery at Kelso. Mr. Drury was a member of the Catholic Church and of the Knights of Columbus. A delegation from the Cape lodge, of which he was a member, accompanied the body to the church.—Cape Girardeau Sun.
