Died

The remains of Miss Lotta Lanning, who died at her home in Festus, Mo., of pneumonia Thursday, July 8, 1920, at 6:20 a. m., was brought to Ste. Genevieve on the Peisco train Saturday morning and taken from the depot to the Catholic Church and after a Requiem Mass the body was laid to rest in the Valle Spring Cemetery. She was 43 years of age. Miss Lanning was born at Bloomsdale and was the daughter of the late Dr. R. F. Lanning and Mrs. Elizabeth Lanning. In 1885 she moved with her parents to Ste. Genevieve where she spent her girlhood days. She still has many friends here who will learn of her death with deepest regrets. In 1898, shortly after her father's death, they moved to Festus where they have resided ever since. Besides her mother she is survived by two brothers, Dr. R. W. Lanning of Ste. Genevieve, and John Lanning of Festus, John Lanning, Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Gamel, and Miss Annie Craig, of Festus, E. T. Gamel, of Plattin, and Miss Jessie Gamel of St. Louis, accompanied the remains.

Drilling Equipment Arrives. Work to Begin Soon.

With the arrival Tuesday of the boiler, engine and other riggings of the Ober Oil, Gas, Coal and Minerals Co., interested parties heaved a sigh of satisfaction and have assumed an attitude of expectancy awaiting the results of drilling on the company's possession, which will begin as soon as the machinery is installed.

Frank Obermuller, head of the company, has been busy all week superintending the unloading of the machinery. He stated that experts will arrive here from Okmulgee, Okla., Thursday and that work of erecting the equipment will begin immediately. It has not yet been announced where the first well will be sunk, but the machinery is being hauled to the vicinity of Staabtown. Mr. Obermuller is confident that the undertaking will prove successful, as indications are strong that oil exists on the company's possessions.

Although the Ober Oil, Gas, Coal and Mineral Co. composed largely of Ste. Genevieve residents, was organized some months ago, and has been a "going" proposition since formed, drilling has been delayed because of the inability to get the necessary machinery, due to the transportation situation, which is retarding work of all character in every section of the country. After cars were procured trouble was experienced in moving them because of the universal congestion of freight which has existed.
