A game of baseball was played between the Army and Navy and Bloomsdale teams, in which the Bloomsdale boys were victorious. Wednesday morning the caravan departed for St. Mary's and held a meeting there in the afternoon and a night meeting at Perryville.

Will Speak From Frisco Train Platform at 5:09 p. m.
