The population of the State of Missouri is 3,403,547, an increase of 110,212, or 3.3 per cent, according to figures announced Monday at Washington. The State as it whole would have shown a decrease had it not been for the percentages of increase rolled up by St. Louis and Kansas City. Nearly every county in the rural sections of the State, the population of which has been announced, has shown a decided decrease since 1910. The decrease in the rural counties has come about only since the war. Heretofore they have gone along each census taking period, every 10 years, showing increases, but young men particularly, since they have returned from war, have been leaving the farms and smaller towns, to go to the cities.

Missouri Marine Heir to Vast Estate and Title of Count.

Anthony Zulpo, born in St. Mary's, Ste. Genevieve County, Mo., has fallen heir to a fortune and title in Italy.

From a private in the United States Marine Corps to a Count in the Italian nobility, with great estates and an income said to be many thousand lira a month, has been the overnight experience of this Missouri boy, who is stationed at Marine Corps Headquarters in Washington, D. C., and who will serve out his enlistment before starting for Italy to claim his new honors. His service period expires in November, so he will not have long to wait.

Zulpo's story reads like a page from a romantic novel, and is filled with the story of the feuds of the Piedmontese nobility, impetuous love and an elopement from the castle of the famous Count of Cereti, in which the heiress of the Count fled with a Colonel in the Italian Army to escape paternal restrictions.

His father's name was Antonio Zulpo, and when Anthony was born he was engaged in business in St. Mary's to which he came with his bride after leaving Italy.

The aged Count of Cereti, died in Genoa at the age of 76. Search was made for an heir, and the Italian authorities endeavored to locate his only daughter in the United States. Search revealed that the daughter had died, and that her only

descendant was Private Anthony Zulpo.—The St. Louis Times.
