DEMOCRATIC DOLLARS.

A dollar contributed by a good Democrat to the Democratic national campaign fund will accomplish a great deal. The contributor of a dollar can feel that he is actually performing one of the following services to the Democratic party: a ten-dollar contribution does ten times as much; a hundred-dollar contribution one hundred times as much, and so on.

It will purchase three hundred eight-page pamphlets on the League of Nations or other Democratic literature, or pay postage on one hundred of them, or buy one hundred and twenty-five buttons.

If used by the Speakers' Bureau, it will carry a Democratic message from one of our speakers to one hundred and fifteen voters.

It must be borne in mind that there are many millions of voters and that they must be reached not once, but many times and in many ways.

Every Democrat can and should do his or her part. And doing one's part consists in giving liberally according to one's ability and means—not merely a nominal sum.

Conscience as well as patriotism and Democracy calls. The League of Nations means peace to the nations. Its rejection means death and suffering to nations, to millions of men, women and children. Invest your money in, do your part for the League of Nations, for Peace, Progress and Prosperity.

Gov. Cox On Article X.

"What has made wars in the past? It has been the loss of territory. Under Article X of the League of Nations a boundary line is a boundary line for the small as well as for the large nations. Every imperialist in Europe is against the League of Nations, but, thank God, there are not as many imperialists as there once were. The people have ceased to take seriously the criticism of Article X."—Governor Cox.

The League To Prevent War.

Every member of the League of Nations solemnly agrees that it will never go to war without first having done one or another of two things, without either submitting the matter in dispute to arbitration, in which case it promises absolutely to abide by the verdict, or, if it does not care to submit it to arbitration, without submitting it to discussion by the council of the League of Nations, in which case it promises to lay all the documents and all the pertinent facts before that council; it consents that that council shall publish all documents and all the pertinent facts, so that all the world shall know them; that it shall be allowed six months in which to reconsider the matter; and that even at the end of the six months, if the decision of the council is not acceptable, it will still not go to war for three months following the rendering of the decision.

It is provided in the covenant of the League of Nations that any nation that disregards these solemn promises with regard to arbitration and discussion shall be thereby deemed ipso facto to have committed an act of war against the other members of the League and that there shall thereupon follow an absolute exclusion of that nation from communication of any kind with the members of the League. No goods can be shipped in or out; no telegraphic messages can be exchanged; there shall be no communication of any kind between the people of the other nations and the people of that nation. There is not a nation in Europe that can stand that for six months. Germany could have faced the armies of the world more readily than she faced the boycott of the world.

What has been proposed to take the place of the \$60,000,000 bond issue to build a system of hard roads in Missouri? Nothing.

John L. Sullivan, Secretary of State, George H. Middlekamp, State Treasurer and Frank W. McAllister, Attorney General, did not support the proposed single tax amendment to the constitution of Missouri when it was submitted to a vote of the people in November, 1912. They voted against the idea of making the land bear all the taxes levied by the state, the counties and the municipalities. The single tax idea was defeated at the polls by a majority of 421,490, the largest majority ever registered against a proposed amendment to the constitution of Missouri in the history of the state. As state officials in 1918 these three men voted against a somewhat modified form of the single tax when they voted to prevent more than double the existing amount of taxes due at the present time from being levied on the farms and city homes of the state. Single tax simply means that land shall pay all the taxes. The effort to more than double land valuation in 1918 was a long move in the direction of this item, but it failed because the three men named would not stand for the injustice.
