H. C. Halley, of the State Highway Department, arrived in Ste. Genevieve Tuesday and Wednesday morning, accompanied by County Judges T. B. Straughan and Vince Valleroy and Henry Herzog drove out over the St. Louis road to the rock glades north of Bloomsdale to see the property owners in regard to right of way for widening that stretch of the road. We were told that the right of way was secured and approximately \$25,000 of Ste. Genevieve county's state road money from the state automobile fund which is available at once, will be used to rebuild and widen the road along the glades, which is about 2 1/2 miles. As soon as the details can be arranged the contract will be let.

Auto Cars Will Run Over C. G. N. Railroad.

What will virtually be an inter-urban for Cape, Jackson, Oak Ridge and Perryville, will soon be started according to a statement of Major Gibony Houck made yesterday to a representative of the Sun.

"Within the next two weeks we will put in operation two Auto-cars between this city and Perryville," said Major Houck. "One will leave Cape Girardeau in the morning returning here in the afternoon and the other will leave Perryville in the morning returning in the afternoon.

"The fare one way will be \$1.00 between Cape and Perryville; 50c from Cape to Oak Ridge and 25c from Cape to Jackson."

Each car will, the Major said, carry eighteen passengers and the running time between this city and Perryville, including stops will be two hours and forty minutes. If the business warrants, the cars will make two round trips daily. The auto-car has proven itself to be the most successful passenger carrying machine, according to the records that are kept of short line passenger hauls. Major Houck declared that many of the trunk line railroads of the country are now using the auto car for short line passenger service and the results are very satisfactory.

The road bed of the former C. G. N. has been repaired so that cars can now make the trip through Perryville. Besides carrying passengers, Major Houck stated that it was the intention of the company to also have a car for carrying milk, poultry, eggs, merchandise and other produce that can be easily and expeditiously handled.

When the cars get in operation a number of business men of this and other towns through which the cars will run will be invited to make a trip over the road and see what service can be rendered to the cities, towns and country through which the line passes.—Cape Girardeau Sun.

A conference was held in St. Louis on Friday, June 3rd, between E. G. Liebald, Secretary of Henry Ford, the automobile manufacturer, and a group of St. Louisians, relative to plans to harness the Mississippi river with innumerable dams, construct hydro electric plants, make the river navigable from the lakes to the gulf, and reclaim thousands of acres of swamp lands. Dr. William Preston Hill and George Mearer suggested the project to Mr. Ford and he was so interested that he had them meet him in Detroit for a personal discussion of the details. A committee consisting of Dr. Hill, Capt. Mearer Hiram Phillips, of St. Louis, and H. Ward Hicks, of Ste. Genevieve, recently made a trip to Detroit to confer with Mr. Ford. The plans for the organization will be submitted to Mr. Ford within the next week and he and a corps of engineers will some time in the near future make a tour down the Mississippi river to determine the best points for dam construction.
