



### All Propositions Carried at Special Election

With the complete official returns from the entire state on the special election held August 2nd, all four of the propositions voted upon carried by safe majorities. The proposition allowing women to hold office passing by the smallest majority of 11,479.

The official returns are: For the constitutional convention: Yes, 177,845; no, 127,130; majority in favor of the convention 50,715.

Giving women the right to hold office: Yes, 159,230; no, 147,751; majority in favor, 11,479.

Using interest on road bonds from automobile funds: Yes, 247,274; no 59,776; majority in favor, 187,498.

Soldiers bonus: Yes, 209,738; no, 100,124, and majority, 109,614. Fifty-nine counties out of the 114 voted against allowing women to hold office; 17 voted against the soldiers' bonus and 61 against calling a convention.

The vote of the state fell about 1,000,000 short of the last general election. In fact, the vote polled at the last general election on state officers totaled over 1,300,000. Apparently, but about one voter out of five cared enough over the result of the election to go to the polls to vote. —Missouri State Journal.

### Body of War Hero Arrived Here Saturday

#### Burial to Take Place Sunday

The funeral services over the body of William P. Kiefer, a Ste. Genevieve boy who died in the service of his country in France during the World War will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 p. m. from the Court House to the Catholic Church, and after the church services and impressive military services by the Buchholtz-Kiefer Post American Legion, the body will be buried in the Valle Spring Cemetery.

Kiefer's remains arrived in Ste. Genevieve on Saturday, August 13th, and were kept at Basler's undertaking parlors until Friday morning at 9 o'clock when the body was escorted to the court house by members of the Buchholtz-Kiefer Post of the American Legion, to lie in state, guarded continuously by members of the Post, until the hour of the funeral.

William P. Kiefer who was born on a farm near Ste. Genevieve was 29 years of age, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Kiefer, and is survived by 3 brothers and 2 sisters, Bridget, Mrs. Joseph Lark of Perryville, Anna C., Mrs. Arthur Jorker of Ste. Genevieve, Thomas of St. Louis, John R. and Fred of Ste. Genevieve.

He left Ste. Genevieve for Camp Funston on April 26, 1918, and was killed in the Meuse Argonne battle on October 23rd, 1918. The Buchholtz-Kiefer Post No. 150, American Legion was named after him and George Buchholtz, another hero from Ste. Genevieve County who gave up his life in the service of his country.

Following will be order of formation at the funeral:

Assembly at one-thirty p. m. Line of march to be formed on Market Street, proceed to Court House, thence to church.

The Ste. Genevieve Band will lead, followed by:

Escort. (Colors and firing squad.) Local and visiting clergy. Caisson with corpse, accompanied by the pall-bearers. Mourners (relatives of deceased)

Members of company of regiment of the deceased who served with him under same command.

All ex-service men of Ste. Genevieve County.

Delegations from other counties, and members of any war veterans' association.

Grand Army of the Republic. Fraternal Societies. Civilians.

All people participating in line of march will march from place of formation to church and from church to the bridge, then the clergy, mourners, G. A. R., disabled soldiers, ladies, organizations and civilians may take conveyances to cemetery. All others are expected to march to cemetery.

The body of Corp. Harris J. Ziegler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph C. Ziegler, of St. Louis, Mo., who was killed in the Argonne battle in September, 1918, arrived in Ste. Louis from France last Saturday. The funeral took place Tuesday morning, August 16th, from the family residence, 5666 Cabanne Ave., to St. Rose's church, thence to Calvary Cemetery. His aunts, Misses Barbara and Blanch Ziegler, of Ste. Genevieve, attended the funeral.

Mrs. Marian Seitz, aged 84 years, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Louis Schach, in Ironton, Mo., on Tuesday, August 9, 1921. Mrs. Seitz was married three times, her last husband preceded her in death 25 years ago. She is survived by 5 children, Joseph Veith of Lawrenceton, William Veith of Idaho, Elizabeth, Mrs. Frk. Wippler of Ste. Genevieve, Wendel Sellinger of St. Louis and Mary, Mrs. Louis Schach of Ironton. The funeral occurred on Thursday, August 11th from the Catholic Church at Arcadia, thence to Pilot Knob Cemetery.

### Southeast Missouri State Teachers College Closes The Best Year in Its History

The Southeast Missouri State Teachers College closed for the year with graduating exercises on Friday evening, August 12, 1921. The largest class in the history of the school graduated. There were 399 students who completed courses leading to diplomas or certificates during the year. Of these 43 students completed four-year college courses leading to the Bachelor's degree; 131 completed two-year or three-year college courses leading to the college diploma which has the force of a life state certificate to teach in the public schools of Missouri; 1 completed the required course for the music diploma; 224 students completed a one-year college course leading to the Regents Certificate.

The school enrolled this year 1,467 students—388 more than were enrolled last year and the largest number of students that were ever enrolled in the college. The College stands at the pinnacle of its prosperous growth in attendance and in the number of students graduating.

Besides the 399 students who completed courses leading to diplomas and certificates this year, about 500 other teachers attended the College during the summer term and made further preparation for teaching.
