

WOULD BE POWERFUL NATION

But Separate Nationality for Ukraine Does Not Seem to Suit the Great Powers.

The Ukrainians are by far the most numerous of the races aspiring to independence through the disappearance of the Romanoffs and Hapsburgs.

The Ukraine is larger than Germany and twice as large as France. It stretches from the Carpathian mountains to the Black sea and the Caucasus.

If the Ukraine manages to survive and keep within its boundaries the territories in which its race predominates, it will be the most populous and the richest of the new states created by the war.

An Independent Ukraine, however, does not seem to fit in with the interests of the victors in the World war, as these interests are conceived by their statesmen.

COMFORT FOR THE AVIATOR

Electrically Heated Coat Protects Against Extreme Cold Encountered in the High Altitudes.

An electrically heated garment, designed especially for use by aviators, has been developed by the genius of an Italian, Antonangelo Negromanti of Milan.

In the high reaches of the atmosphere, into which aviators ascend, there is even in summer time cold so severe that the thickest garments of padded and fur-trimmed leather do not afford adequate protection.

The Negromanti coat is woven of threads which, both warp and weft, are electrically resistant wires coated with a fireproof insulating material—ashostos or silk.

The wires are connected with a source of electric current (which may be a battery of accumulators), and also with an apparatus which contains an aneroid barometer.

The tests prove that the injurious forms of fly life were not distributed on any large scale by artificial means, but rather that many of the far-flying species showed marked migratory habits.

Measurements Shows Flies Travel Long Distances

That the house fly not uncommonly makes a journey of 5 to 6 miles in the space of 24 hours, is shown by experiments conducted by the Bureau of Entomology, United States Department of Agriculture.

Fly flights tests were conducted in northern Texas where approximately 231,000 flies of many different species were trapped, then dusted with finely powdered red chalk, and liberated.

The tests showed that the flies, after regaining their freedom, would travel distances up to 1,000 feet in a few minutes.

The screw-worm fly evidenced its power to cover a half mile in 3 hours, while the black blowfly traveled anywhere from half a mile to 11 miles during the first two days release.

The house fly covered over 6 miles in less than 24 hours. Observations at the Rebecca Light Shoal off the coast of Florida seemed to show that flies come down the wind from Cuba (95 miles distance), and at times from the Marquesas Keys (24 miles distance), and even from Key West, Fla., 46 miles away.

Parsnip and salsify are hardy, and the roots may be safely left in place through the winter. As early in the spring as they can be handled and before they start into growth, experts of the United States Department of Agriculture advise, the roots should be dug, carefully sorted, and the ones immediately reset from 3 to 5 feet apart.
