The board holds that conditions are improving owing to increased vaccination, but insists that the necessity of vaccination still exists and gives notice that in case of renewed outbreaks of small pox, "drastic action" may be taken.

The Treasury Department now offers for sale a new issue of Treasury Savings Certificates in three denominations, maturing five years from date of issue and bearing compound semi-annual interest at 4 1/2 percent if held until maturity. Secretary Mellon announced. The prices for the three denominations will be \$20, \$50 and \$100 which at maturity will yield \$25, \$100 and \$1,000, respectively.

The limit of holdings has been increased by the Act of Congress, approved November 23, 1921, from \$1000 to \$5000 and it is now possible therefore to hold Treasury Certificates of any one series up to an aggregate maturity, not exceeding \$5,000. This change makes the Certificates attractive for the investment of trust funds and surplus funds of labor, fraternal, church and similar organizations, which seek an investment of intermediate length, with absolute safety and a satisfactory income. The new certificates are redeemable before their maturity at their cost, plus 3 1/2 percent interest compounded semi-annually.

The new issue has the hearty endorsement of President Harding as part of the Governmental encouragement to thrift. The new offering means that Postal Savings and Treasury Savings activities have been coordinated into one peace-time savings program, under which the Post office Department and Treasury will join to advance Postal Savings Certificates for investment. The plan is designed to stimulate the accumulation of savings by accepting deposits in amounts of \$1 or more through the Postal Saving Banks by offering Treasury Saving Certificates on more attractive terms, in convenient denominations, both for direct sale and on conversion of Postal Savings deposits.

The small war time Treasury securities comprising the 25 cent Thrift Stamp and the \$5 War Savings Stamp are being discontinued, effective December 31st, 1921, but the Thrift Stamps outstanding will be accepted at face value for the new Treasury Savings Securities or will be redeemed at face value in cash at postoffices.

The new Securities were placed on sale at the Postoffices December 15th.

Information Concerning Soldier's Bonus

1. Soldier must have resided within the State of Missouri at least 12 months immediately prior to April 7th, 1917.

2. Must have served honorably in the Military or Navy forces of the U. S. at any time between the 6th day of April, 1917, and the 11th day of April, 1918.

3. No person will be entitled to a bonus who has received a bonus from another State for the same service.

4. Will be paid only to the individual soldier, who cannot assign or sell it.

5. In case of death, bonus is payable to the order named to surviving wife, child, mother, father.

6. Rate of bonus: \$10.00 per month or major portion thereof, while in active service, not to exceed the sum of \$250.00.

7. The commission will not be able to begin payment until after the bonds are sold, which will be about May 1st 1922, so do not make your application until it publicly announces it is ready, as you will only waste your time and theirs.
