TARIFF EFFECTIVE AS SOON AS PASSED

New Rates Will be Charged as Soon as the Measure Becomes a Law—Decision is Reached Friday.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Majority members of the senate finance committee decided that all schedules of the new tariff bill, except sugar and wool, should become effective immediately after the enactment of the measure into law.

Sugar, with the approval of the democratic caucus, will be subject to the Payne-Aldrich rates until March 1, 1914. The committee tentatively agreed upon a date for the wool schedule but did not announce it, because of a promise to confer with Senators Walsh and Thomas, who could not be reached Friday. The committee will confer with them Saturday before the final session of the caucus.

Additional revenue was provided for by the committee when it decided in view of the revenue tax on brandies used in fortifying sweet wines, to levy a revenue tax of 25 percent ad valorem in what are known as "spurious wines," wines made from pumms and fortified with chemicals. Containers of such wines must bear a label, showing what materials enter into the product.

Another change proposed relates to the clause prohibiting importation of convict-made goods. It was amended so as to read that such goods be excluded from countries which do not "prohibit" convict labor. Originally the clause read from countries which did not "restrict" convict labor.

Chairman Simmons said Friday that he expected general debate on the bill to begin a week from Monday. He will report the measure probably Wednesday, and it is his opinion that the debate will be limited to five weeks.

Regarding the binding resolution which will be adopted by the caucus, Sen. Simmons said that its provisions would bind every democratic senator who did not withdraw from the caucus, whether he voted for the resolution or against it, or even if he was absent when the vote was taken, unless he had previously pledged himself to his constituency to vote against some rate or principle involved in the bill.

The amendment to the bill fixing the stamp tax on cotton sales sold for future delivery, members of the committee believe will bring in considerable revenue. Though the primary design of the amendment is to abolish stock exchange gambling in cotton futures, it is the general opinion that it will not do so, but that it will considerably curtail it. In that case the government will derive some revenue, but this cannot be estimated.

Should the stamp tax on cotton futures deals fail to curtail this form of stock dealing, Sen. Simmons said today, "the revenue to the government would be enormous."

TOY BALLOON DOES DAMAGE OF \$5,000

Lights on Stable at Evansville and Second Alarm is Needed to Extinguish Flames.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., July 5.—At 9 o'clock Friday night a paper balloon fell on a stable roof near Main and Franklin sts. Before it was extinguished a second alarm had been sent in, four stables, a junk shop and a feed store had been destroyed and a big hardware and seed store was damaged. Included in the loss were six valuable driving horses. The total damage is placed at \$5,000. Two minor fires were caused by fire crackers.

Ed. Lannert, 11 years old, tried to pick up a giant cracker. His left wrist was burned and torn by the explosion.

SPEND THE FOURTH HEARING EVIDENCE

Evansville Jury Busy Trying Case of Man Accused of Killing Interurban Conductor.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., July 5.—Twelve men, jurors in the case of the state against Parley King, charged with murdering Samuel Koehler, an interurban conductor, spent their fourth of July in the circuit court here Friday listening to evidence introduced by the state. Homer Ellsworth, who witnessed the killing testified that after the conductor insisted that King stop his rowdiness on the car the latter stabbed him several times. The defense stated they would show King acted in self defense.

WIFE GREET'S HER RIVAL WITH A CANE

Starts Something When She Finds Her Husband Embracing Another in the Park.

PITTSBURGH, July 5.—When John Huttlinger and Mrs. Alice Linheart, weight 180 pounds, were embracing each other in West park, Wednesday, Mrs. Huttlinger, who weighs 105 and who has always believed herself to be the head of the Huttlinger household, appeared on the scene.

Mrs. Huttlinger seized her husband's cane and belabored Mrs. Linheart over the head and shoulders, handing her a verbal lash with every blow that stung as deeply as did the whirling stick.

Mr. Huttlinger finally managed to get between his wife and Mrs. Linheart and the latter was able to get out of the angry wife's way.

A park policeman appeared on the scene at this juncture and placed the three under arrest. They were fined \$10 each, charged with disorderly conduct.

PRAYERS HELP EVEN PATRIOTS

Evangelist Fife Tells Audience That Men Like Washington and Jefferson Knew How to Pray.

Even though it was the night of the fourth a large crowd attended the services at the First Christian church, when Evangelist Fife delivered a special patriotic sermon.



