DEMOCRATS VOTE SOLID ON TARIFF

Republicans Offer Many Amendments But They Are Turned Down—Little Headway is Made During Day.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Republican senators continued to offer amendments to nearly every paragraph of the Underwood-Simmons tariff bill when it reading was resumed Thursday, and democrats, in solid phalanx, voted them down.

As a result of the prolonged discussion on rate after rate little progress was made during the two hours' consideration of the measure after general debate had proceeded throughout the afternoon. Senators Works of California, and Weeks of Massachusetts, criticizing the bill. When adjournment came the senate had barely made an impression on the chemical schedule, the first schedule in the bill.

An amendment by Sen. Smoot to transfer saffron and safflower from the dutiable list at 10 per cent, to the free list, upon which he demanded a roll call, was voted down, 40 to 27, by a strict party vote. Another amendment by Sen. Smoot to increase the rate on formaldehyde from one cent to two cents per pound encountered republican opposition, when Sen. Gronna of North Dakota declared one cent high enough because formaldehyde was very essential to the farmers. Sen. Smoot withdrew the amendment.

When Sen. Smoot sought to restore amber gum to the free list, striking

out the proposed duty of \$1 per pound, Sen. Stone wanted to know why the government should not get revenue from pipe stems made from amber as well as from tobacco.

Sen. Lodge protested against the proposed duty of five cents a pound on camphor and declared he would demand a record vote later on an amendment to place it on the free list.

Sen. Weeks said the democratic party had promised "to correct all of the existing conditions with the end in view of bettering all mankind."

MAY GIVE THE MINE WORKERS A TRIAL

Cases Are Expected to Come Up Even Though Grand Jury Returns No Indictments.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Atty. Gen. McReynolds may permit Pres. White and other officials of the United Mine Workers to go to trial on their recent indictments at Charleston, W. Va., for alleged violation of the Sherman anti-trust law in connection with the West Virginia coal strike, even though the evidence in possession of the government may seem insufficient to sustain the action of U. S. Atty. Harold A. Ritz in presenting the charges to the grand jury.

No definite conclusion has yet been

reached, but the attorney general is looking into the situation and officials of the department of justice declared Thursday it might be better in any event in this case to let the issue go before the court.

If tried, the case will be heard at the October term of court, and by that time a successor will have been appointed to Ritz, whose term has expired.

REFUGEES ON THEIR WAY

LOS ANGELES, July 25.—Twenty American women refugees from the Yaqui river valley in Sonora are expected to arrive Friday at the mouth of the Colorado river on board the yacht Paxinos.

This information was contained in a message from American Consul Simplich of Nogales, Sonora, to officers here of a Mexican construction company. The party contains the company's employes, their wives and daughters.
