

HUGE ALIMONY PLEA STARTLES JUSTICE

Woman Asks for \$20,000 a Year From Physician While Justice Gets Only \$17,500 for His Work.

NEW YORK, July 25.—Supreme Court Justice Donnelly was surprised Saturday when counsel for Mrs. Caroline W. Griffin, who is suing Dr. Edward Harrison Griffin, a physician at 55 W. 4th st., for a separation, asked that she be allowed alimony of \$20,000 a year pending the determination of her suit.

Justice Donnelly reserved decision, after he declared he would never allow such an amount as \$20,000 a year. When Mr. Thompson explained that Mrs. Griffin desired to educate her two younger sons for professions he decided to hear argument.

"Twenty thousand dollars a year seems an awful lot of money to me," said the justice, who received a salary of only \$17,500 a year.

Mr. Thompson said that Dr. Griffin's income, so far as his wife knew, was in the neighborhood of \$80,000 a year.

Coudert Bros., representing Dr. Griffin, denied he was worth any such amount as Mrs. Griffin alleged, to which Mr. Thompson retorted that he had affidavits to show that Dr. Griffin owned \$400,000 worth of real estate in New York city alone.

"His income," said Mr. Thompson, "is greater than the salary paid the president of the United States."

Mr. Thompson said that Mrs. Griffin's two oldest sons were practicing physicians in this city.

Dr. Griffin asks for the custody of his 11-year-old son.


