Big things are ahead for Cordova because it is at present the nearest seaport to the great Behring River coal fields which Uncle Sam is talking seriously of opening up soon. Also, some day, Americans in the great country around the golden Yukon river, to the north, will want Uncle Sam to build a railroad to the south coast of Alaska, giving them quick transportation to the states. It is said that Cordova is the logical sea terminal for such a line.

OPEN AIR REVIVAL AT LOWELL HEIGHTS

Brush Arbor Will Accommodate the Crowds Who Came to Hear Rev. W. M. Gunn.

An open air revival will be held at Lowell Heights M. E. church next month as a result of a decision made by the committee on Monday night. A large brush arbor will be constructed adjacent to the church where Rev. W. M. Gunn of Otterbein, Ind., will deliver his sermons. The roof will be made of large brushes and it is claimed the building will be much cooler than the church. Accommodations will be made to seat between 800 and 1,000 people.

For sometime the committee has been handicapped in arranging for the campaign to hold either two or three weeks as the church is too small. Much of the labor is to be donated.

A meeting of the men of the social and Bible class will be held at the church Tuesday night when the social conditions of South Bend will be discussed. Although the political situation will be discussed no politicians are invited. The meetings will not take the discussion of any particular party, but views and opinions will be given by all the men.

Arrangements have been made to send eight or ten boys to the summer camp conducted at Winona, Ind., by Homer Rodeheaver, member of the Sunday party. The boys will leave August 5 for the camp to stay two or three weeks. Later an effort will be made to send more.

SLASHED SKIRT COMES IN FOR MORE CRITICISM

Father F. J. Jansen of Elkhart Says Women Need to be Brought to Their Senses.

ELKHART, Ind., July 29.—The slashed or slit skirt and its companion, the transparent skirt, have been mercilessly scored by Fr. F. J. Jansen, pastor of the St. Vincent's Catholic church. The enactment of a city ordinance and its rigid enforcement were recommended to "bring some sense to their senses."

"Any woman who wears such a costume into my church will be asked to leave or will be ejected," declared the priest Monday.

"The present trend of our civilization in this respect is distinctly backward," asserts Fr. Jansen. "It is but a step from the pinnacle where we now stand to the condition of the savage tribes who wear no clothes at all. It is time for the law to step in and take a hand. If the evil cannot be checked in any other way, city councils should pass ordinances against all immodest forms of dressing; to appoint police to watch for infractions with the power to order from the street any and all women who appear thereon improperly or immodestly dressed."

INVITE BEVERIDGE TO PAY VISIT TO ELKHART

ELKHART, Ind., July 29.—With the anticipated acceptance of an invitation extended to former Sen. Albert J. POLICEMAN USES HIS COAT TO SHIELD GIRL

Transparent Gown too Much For the Eyesight of Philadelphia Cop.

PHILADELPHIA, July 29.—Philadelphia Monday frowned upon the transparent skirt, and as a representative guardian of the city's morals, Magistrate Tracey told a young woman that if she appeared on the streets again in one of the diaphanous garments she would be sent to jail, although she was released for the first offense with a reprimand.

"But, judge, I only have one petticoat and that was being washed. I wanted to take a walk and did not think I would cause such a disturbance," was the plea of the young woman who refused to give her name.

Policeman Walsh was traveling along his beat when sighted the young woman and her skirt. He hesitated first between the temptation to flee and the desire to carry out the law. Bystanders saw him take off his coat, and this meant Walsh was getting ready to rush to the rescue of the city. Approaching the young woman he threw his coat about her, shutting off the view given by the skirt, and then escorted her before the court.

Police Are Informed of an Attempt to Stop Party at Michigan and Paris Sts.

An attempt was made to assault and hold up David Hein, 416 W. Monroe st.; Louis Slutsky, 321 W. Jefferson boulevard, and Moses Brodsky,

462 Dubail av., Monday night by five strange men.

The three men were going home with Brodsky a little after 11 o'clock at night when they were attacked by one of the five men. They broke into a fast walk and at the corner of Michigan and Paris sts., caught a street car and came back toward the business district of the city, in an effort to escape. Whether the attempted assault was made for the purpose of robbing the men is not known. The three men could not furnish the police with a description of their assailants, however the officers are investigating.

FAIR BATHERS MUST WEAR ENOUGH SKIRTS

Chicago Mayor Issues Edict to the Police to See That Women Are Properly Garbed.

CHICAGO, July 28.—Mayor Harrison Monday directed the police to see that proper costumes are worn by women at the public bathing beaches. The mayor's attention was called to the picture in a newspaper showing a woman who had taken off her bathing skirt after she had gone in the water.

"Such exhibitions are worse than the cabarets," said the mayor. "No woman should think of wearing that kind of a costume and my idea is that the police should gently but firmly insist on the lady putting on proper costumes."

THREE SUFFRAGETS FREED

Sentence Reduced From Fourteen to Four Days.

LONDON, July 29.—Lady Sybil Smith, daughter of the Earl of Antrim, Mrs. Pethick Lawrence and Miss Evelyn Sharpe, militant suffragets, were released from jail Monday. The home secretary, Reginald McKenna, reduced their sentences from 14 days to four. They were sent to prison on July 25 for trying to hold a meeting in the lobby of the house of commons.

BOY'S BODY IS FOUND IN A CLUMP OF BUSHES

Chicago Lad's Hands Were Tied Behind Him and Coat Sleeve Was Used as a Gag.

CHICAGO, July 29.—The body of Bernie Holstein, 14 years old, was found in a clump of bushes in Morgan park Monday. There was a bullet hole in the head. In the hip pocket of the boy's trousers was a school certificate giving his name. The body was lying face downward with the hands tied behind the back with the boy's shirt. The legs were tied with a pair of suspenders and the boy's coat was lying under his head. One of the sleeves had been used as a gag. There were several bruises on the body.

During the evening the members of his congregation presented him with a South Bend gold watch, which is an exact duplicate of the one presented to Billy Sunday.

Serving at the punch bowl were Miss Irene Johnson and Mrs. L. T. Martin. The official board with their wives constituted the reception committee. The large hall was attractively decorated with palms and flowers.

OLD ENGINE IS REBUILT

No. 401 on the B. & O. Has Been in Wrecks That Killed 14.

WASHINGTON, Ind., July 29.—Baltimore & Ohio Southwestern engine No. 401, which has been in wrecks that have caused the death of 14 men, was turned out of the local railroad shops here Monday after having been rebuilt. The engine went into Blue hole in the White river here the night of March 28, carrying the engine men to their death. The engine was under water for three months.

WOMEN CAN BE CLERKS

According to Judge They Can Serve on Election Days.

CHICAGO, July 29.—In an opinion given Monday, County Judge Owens held that all women are eligible for appointment as clerks of election and that all women who can qualify as householders—that is, who are the head of the family, supporting it independently—may serve as judges of elections under the new women suffrage law in Illinois.
