MAKE YOUR HOME ONE OF SUNSHINE

Yellow and Cream Scheme Carried Out in All the Rooms Makes an Ideal Style of Furnishing.

It makes one stop and think, not a sunshiny house with the sun streaming in every window, but a house of sunshine. Sunshine in furnishings, sunshine in harmony, sunshine in temper, and above all, sunshine in love. Wouldn't that make a wonderful home?

Perhaps if we started with the furnishings suggestive of all the other virtues, the latter would, by suggestion, become more attainable, so we will start by tinting or papering all the lower walls a very deep cream, not a milk wagon cream, but a good country Jersey cream which comes perilously near yellow.

On the floors, which are oak, we will use the Martha Washington squares of yellow and white, but from the fact that they are washable and very easily cleaned, they might prove too light in color, but this virtue makes them very satisfactory.

Wicker furniture with their large cushions dyed in yellow linen, the same yellow linen used as outer hangings, over deep cream marquisette window curtains will produce the sunshine look. The sofa cushions can be of the shaded linens, from canary through to orange. Use the yellow for table covers and the lining of the lamp's wicker shade.

Flower Boxes at Windows.

Under the three front windows have wicker flower boxes strained yellow, and keep filled with ferns and some yellow blooming plants. Early winter brings the yellow primrose, the corn tulips and daffodils, but through the hot summer months when the rooms must be kept partially shaded, ferns will be all you can successfully use, for blooming plants need much sunshine.

In the dining room a set of bird's-eye maple will accentuate and make more attractive your yellow scheme; and here the yellow linen curtains over the cream marquisette window curtains will produce the sunshine look. A set of Dutch ware with a yellow tulip border is both inexpensive and effective. The window boxes used here also would look very attractive.

The two bedrooms should also be yellow. For the first yellow maple set with some pretty flowered chintz in yellow and white for furniture coverings, one set of curtains which should be of some sheer white muslin, as all you want to use for here you need all the air possible. For the second bedroom, a yellow and white narrow stripe is always good, and has the added advantage of making a room look larger than it really is. Even the bathroom can have a yellow and white rug, and the linen have monograms done in yellow.

Sun Porch in Wicker.
The sun porch should be all in wicker, left in its natural color. This will harmonize better with the yellow denim cushions you will want to use. The boxes beneath the windows should be filled with ferns and white daisies, for these colors are cool and fresh. The cut flowers used can be kept in yellow. The rugs here are best of green crex.

And so, as you live in your yellow home, make it for yourself and all who come beneath your roof, a place of sunshine, given in such abundance, that those who come to you from the shady and shadowed plans of life, will receive its life giving rays, and carry back with them enough to make in their turn "Sunshine in shady places."

FAVORITE RECIPES OF SOUTH BEND WOMEN

Royal Fruit Cake.

Mrs. Hawkins has submitted a recipe that housekeepers will appreciate when the time comes for making holiday sweets. It is also an excellent recipe for a wedding cake.

The formula follows:
Two cups light brown sugar.
Cream with one cup butter.
Four eggs.
One-half cup sweet milk.
One cup molasses.
Four cups flour.
Three teaspoons rounded full of baking powder.

After mixing in the order given add the following fruits and spices.
Three cups seeded raisins.
One cup chopped citron.
Three cups currants.
One pound of English walnuts, (unshelled).
One pound of figs, figs and nuts to be cut up in small pieces.
One teaspoon ground cinnamon.
One teaspoon ground nutmeg.
One-half teaspoon ground cloves.

In measuring cups may be heaped or level, just so it is carried out through recipe. Bake slowly in three loaves for about one and one-half hours.
