### LOST SHIRT CAUSES COMMOION ON SHIP

It Carried Fortune of Italian and Somebody Threw It Overboard.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—A shirt caused a commotion in mid-Atlantic during the voyage of the Str. Taromina, which docked today from Italy. Emilie Lombardi, a steamer passenger found the air of the Atlantic so very hot in mid-ocean that he took off his shirt and flung it on deck. A fastidious fellow-voyager, supposing that the shirt had been discarded by somebody, threw it into the sea.

When Lombardi discovered his loss he was frantic and shouting the Italian equivalent of "man overboard" he pleaded for a life saving crew to recover his garment. He explained that all the money he had, 500 francs was sewed in the shirt. But by that time the shirt was far out of sight. Lombardi was taken before the captain, who believed his story and to save him from deportation when he arrived here the steamship line repaid him with \$100 in United States treasury notes.
