

Mother of Ten Takes Oldest Sons on 1500-Mile Walk to Show Them a Stretch of the Country

Special Correspondence. NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Just to prove that Edward Payson Weston has nothing on her, Mrs. Marie B. Chester, the mother of ten children, has started to stroll from New York to Minneapolis. If she follows her schedule, she will beat the Weston records, and this, she says, she has ample faith in doing. Weston walked for the glory of being called the champion pedestrian. This woman, who has brought ten children into the world, is making the trip for the double purpose of showing a good part of the U. S. to her boys and to earn money with which to rebuild a home that was burned down.

Mrs. Chester is forty-five years of age and is accompanied on her trip by two of her sons, Henry and Charles, aged fourteen and thirteen, respectively. Mother and children are experienced campers. They started from the city hall after shaking hands with Mayor Gaynor, who gave them a letter requesting persons along the route to show them every courtesy. Mrs. Chester wore a short skirt, a loose, comfortable waist, a broad straw hat and stout, thick-soled shoes. She carries a satchel swung over her shoulders and carries a stout walking stick. Her boys are dressed in loose, comfortable outing costumes and each of them carries a satchel and a stick. They will stop at Middletown, N. Y., their home, where they will pick up a trained dog they have taught to draw a wagon. The wagon will be used to carry equipment.

They will be independent of hotels on their trip and will "camp out" all the way. Mrs. Chester plans to complete her journey of about 1,500 miles in 60 days. After the fire which destroyed her home, Mrs. Chester lost her health and was unable to get work. She regained strength and health by systematic walking and she has taught all her children to walk long distances and to take care of themselves in the open.

The president, it was learned, desires through the communication to make perfectly clear to the Huerta government what the views of the administration here are, and at the white house it was stated that these views are intended to help the situation in Mexico without any intervention or undue meddling on the part of the United States.

Much has been left to Mr. Lind's discretion, but it was stated authoritatively that no change in principle would be made in the communication which he carries, and he is instructed to carry out to the letter the general program outlined for him before he went to Mexico City.

To Reiterate Statement. While there is no official announcement forthcoming, it is generally understood that the communication which Mr. Lind bears is substantially a reiteration of Pres. Wilson's Latin-American statement issued early in his administration, in which he pointed out that the United States must prefer in its associates those governments which were set up through law and order rather than those that sprang into being through irregular and arbitrary forces.

It is also generally accepted that the communication points out that recognition by the United States can be extended only to a government which is created through a constitutional election. It is Pres. Wilson's hope that suspension of hostilities may be brought about in Mexico and an early election called. The Mexican situation promised to come up again in the senate Friday, as Sen. Penrose planned Thursday night to make an appeal in behalf of Sherley C. Hulse, who, with his wife and daughter, is said to be in danger in Chihuahua. Hulse is a son-in-law of Lieut.-Gov. Reynolds of Pennsylvania. Secy. Bryan Thursday dispatched a telegram to the American consul at Juarez instructing him to use a courier if necessary to get word to the American consul at Chihuahua to take measures to relieve the Hulses. ASKS DISSOLUTION OF ELBEL COMPANY

Herman Elbel Alleges That His Two Brothers Refuse to Buy His Share or Sell Their Interests to Him.

Charging that his two brothers froze him out of a part in the management of the musical instrument business which has been operated in South Bend since 1891, Herman Elbel has filed suit against Richard and Robert Elbel, asking the appointment of a receiver to sell the business and divide the proceeds. Herman Elbel charges that he has offered to sell his interest or buy that of his brothers but they have been able to reach no agreement. The action was filed Thursday afternoon in the circuit court.

When the business was organized more than 24 years ago, according to the complaint, the three brothers had an equal share in the store. There was no limit of duration for the partnership set at that time. Herman Elbel alleges that on July 1, 1913, he offered to sell his interest in the firm for \$25,000. Both the partners refused this he declares, but offered to pay him \$10,000, he says. He refused that and then offered to buy out his brothers paying \$25,000 to each. This proposition was also turned down according to the complaint. The plaintiff alleges that the contracts for instruments sold on the installment plan which the firm now hold are worth \$75,000. The fixtures and stock are worth \$15,000 and the lease on the building, at 106 S. Michigan street, which extends for three years more, is worth \$3,000. PROF. HENRI MARION IS DEAD AT CULVER

Was Official Interpreter When Body of John Paul Jones Was Brought Back Here.

CULVER, Ind., Aug. 15.—Prof. Henri Marion, for 30 years professor of modern languages in the United States naval academy, died in a hospital here Thursday of a general decline. Prof. Marion was designated by the government as the official interpreter of the party that brought back the body of John Paul Jones from France

to this country in 1906 and later wrote a volume on "The last cruise and final resting place of John Paul Jones." He was the author of many text books in French and Spanish. He is survived by the widow and one son, Ensign Paul Marion, U. S. N., who is now aboard the Kansas. The widow is traveling in Europe.

REV. V. C. SOARES IS TO RETURN TO CHICAGO

Assistant Pastor at First Baptist Has One More Year Before Getting His Degree.

V. C. Soares of Chicago, who during the past few months has been acting assistant to Rev. Charles A. Decker at the First Baptist church, will leave the city Friday afternoon to return to Chicago, where he will complete his course at the Divinity

school. He will also act as supply minister for Baptist churches. Mr. Soares came to South Bend shortly after the Billy Sunday services closed, and has filled the capacity of assistant to the pastor of the First Baptist church, with credit. The larger part of the personal work visiting those who had signed cards and other work was taken care of by him. He has one more year of college work before getting his degree.

SHORTAGE IS \$305,000

WILSON GIVEN A REPRIMAND FOR HIS STATEMENT

Ambassador Page Ordered to Express Regret to England That U. S. Official Should Make Such Remarks.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Pres. Wilson Thursday night publicly reprimanded Ambassador Henry Lane Wilson for his recent attack on the British foreign office. Ambassador Page was instructed to express to Sir Edward Grey the regret of the American government that a diplomatic official of the United States "should have been guilty of such an impropriety." The action of the administration here followed receipt of a cablegram from Ambassador Page officially confirming the Associated Press dispatch which had quoted a statement from the British government that it had recognized the Huerta regime in Mexico along with France and Germany after "a congratulatory speech" to Pres. Huerta by Ambassador Wilson on behalf of the diplomatic corps in Mexico City. The official interpretation of the statement here was that Great Britain at the time believed from Ambassador Wilson's act that the United States intended to recognize the Huerta government. Ambassador Wilson in an authorized interview declared that if the statement really emanated from the British foreign office, it was "pure subterfuge, unworthy of the character of its tradition and with the character it has maintained before the world for two centuries."

Wires Ambassador Page. Secy. Bryan, after a conference with the president Thursday night, then sent the following cablegram to Ambassador Page: "The interview given to the press Wednesday by Mr. Henry Lane Wilson, whose resignation as ambassador to Mexico had been accepted to take effect at the end of his vacation, Oct. 14, having been brought to the president's attention, he directs me to ask you to call at the British foreign office and say to Sir Edward Grey that he disclaims all responsibility for Mr. Wilson's action in the matter and for the language employed by him in this interview, and that he regrets exceedingly that a diplomatic official in the employ of this government should have been guilty of such an impropriety."

Secy. Bryan not only gave the above to the press, but issued the following statement: "A copy of the cablegram to the American embassy was sent to Ambassador Wilson. Mr. Bryan added that the president does not go farther at this time because he takes it for granted that the action which he is obliged to take in this matter will be to him (Ambassador Wilson) a sufficient reminder of his official duties. In this connection, it was admitted that the administration seriously had considered a summary acceptance of Ambassador Wilson's resignation to take effect immediately, but it was said by officials who characterized Thursday night's action as a sufficient reprimand, that only in the event of any other utterance or action distasteful to the administration by the ambassador, would such a course be followed. Administration officials felt particularly solicitous about the possible effect of Ambassador Wilson's remarks in Great Britain because at this time the American government is relying upon the moral support of the European powers in the effort to suggest a peaceful ending to the Mexican revolution.

Favor Peace Policy. Informal assurances have been received by Pres. Wilson that foreign governments are disposed to look with favor upon the peace policy being pursued by the United States, and in turn the Washington administration intends to keep these governments fully advised of the steps taken by John Lind, personal representative of the president in Mexico. Definite information came from the white house Thursday concerning Mr. Lind's mission to the effect that he carried the views of the American government toward Mexico in written and that he would present these


