NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Pittsburgh evened the series with New York by taking the fourth game 8 to 3. The visitors hit Fromme hard in the first and second innings scoring six runs. In each of these innings, Carey drove a home run into the upper tier of the grandstand. His long drive in the second followed Adams' single and Brynes' double.

25 CENTRAL LEAGUE PLAYERS GO HIGHER
