

FEMALE IS MORE DEADLY THAN IS MALE MOSQUITO

Dr. S. C. Shumucker Tells Teachers at County Institute That Insect is Great Source of Ill Health.

Doctors E. H. Green and S. C. Schumucker of the department of biological sciences in the state Normal school at West Chester, Pa., were the chief speakers when the annual county teachers' institute opened at the high school Monday.

Oxford University and Her Literary Men was the subject taken by Dr. Green for his lecture of the afternoon. He described Oxford's 22 colleges in detail, mentioning many of the noted men. Among them were: Pembroke, which graduated Samuel Johnson, Blackstone and Brown; Christ church, which graduated Ben Johnson, Sydney, the Wesleys and Ruskin; Merton—from which Robert Steele came;—graduating such men as Sir Walter Raleigh, Thomas Hughes and Bishop Butler; Hertford, graduating Dean Swift; Magdalen, graduating Addison, Gibbon, Keade and Christopher North; Balliol, graduating Browning and Adams Smith. He also spoke of Ruskin institution founded by Americans in 1839.

Talks on the Mosquito. Dr. Schumucker closed the day's program with his lecture on the subject, "The Mosquito and His Dangers." He said that man excelled the lower orders of animals only in brain power, the ant being able to outlift him proportionately 10 to 12 times. He pointed out the wonderful powers and qualities possessed by the smaller animals.

To show how the mosquito was in a way superior to man he described its structure, tracing it through its stages of growth from the egg to full size. Malaria, he explained can come to a person only by being bitten by the female of the species, which has itself been inoculated by sucking the blood from some one who has the disease. Yellow fever, a disease of the tropics, is carried in the same way. To destroy the mosquito he said that the land must first be drained, and that coal oil should be poured into the low places, ponds and stagnant water, and that gold fish and sun fish might be placed in the waters to eat the larvae.

DR. PALMER TO SPEAK TO PERSONAL WORKERS

Dr. Palmer spoke to a large audience Sunday evening at Hope chapel. His text was "Not a whit less fervent in spirit, serving the Lord". J. G. Ames, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., will conduct the mid-week prayer service.

FOLKS SHOULD STAY HOME

Fawn Shop Man Says Visitors Are Expensive Luxury.

No less than a dozen persons have pledged their jewelry within two weeks, according to Mr. Perry, because relatives and friends who have been visiting them have caused grocery and butcher bills to mount so high that more money was necessary.

LADS CARRYING LETTER OF SYMPATHY TO SULZER

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—Five east side lads, ranging in age from 13 to 15 years, have started on a hike to Albany, with a letter expressing sympathy for Gov. Sulzer. The heralds are members of the East Side Protective association, an organization of 5,000 schoolboys.

The little band is dressed in khaki uniforms, with knapsacks. Meals will be cooked over camp fires and beds made in the open air. The boys hope to reach Albany by Thursday to present their message to Gov. Sulzer.

WILL FINISH ON TIME

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SLAVERY EXISTS IN PHILIPPINES

According to Commissioner's Report Young Children Are Bought and Sold by the Land Owners.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Slavery in the full meaning of the word exists throughout the Philippines, even in the city of Manila and penance is general in the islands, according to a special report Commissioner Dean Worcester has made to the insular government. It has not been received here by the war department but copies are in the hands of other officials.

Philippines in some parts of the islands commonly capture children and sell them into slavery for profit; some are sent to China where they are dressed in the native fashion. Some children have been enticed from their homes by slave agents upon promises of scholarships in schools and some of them in an instance which Mr. Worcester reports in detail, were sold and others were farmed out for money. He cites the case of a 13-year-old girl bought for some pigs, rice, chickens and a cloak. The supreme court of the islands released the slave trade on the ground that no crime had been committed because no physical force had been used. This one case, Mr. Worcester says, has blocked other prosecutions. The Philippine assembly has blocked laws for the suppression of the traffic, he says, because many of its members come from provinces where slavery flourishes. One of his reports on the traffic, he says, lies tabled in the Philippine assembly. Mr. Worcester declares he had great difficulty in getting facts of slave cases and intimates that reports were withheld by the office of the Philippine constabulary. He cites the case of a Philippine assemblyman caught re-warded owning a slave girl in Manila and says: "I could obtain conclusive evidence of a hundred, a thousand, ten thousand of them but why multiply cases. It is simply a case of time and work." He charges that Philippine assemblymen maintain penance on their own farms.

CITY FORESTER TURNED DOWN

Proposition to Place Shade Trees of the City in Control of City Employe Defeated, Six to Three.

With a vote of six to three against it, the ordinance providing for the office of a city forester, was turned down at the meeting of the council Monday night. The ordinance has been switched from the committee of the whole to the council and then back again several times. By request of the Personal Workers' league, Rev.
