

JOHNSON LOSES MAKE IT FIFTEEN

Washington Star Pitcher Holds Boston to One Run in Eleven Innings But Senators Fail to Tally.

JOHNSON STATISTICS.
Allowed the Red Sox three hits; at one time pitched 17 strikes before a ball was called; did not give a base on balls; made 96 pitches in 11 innings, of which 69 were strikes; fanned 19 men, including every member of the team except Engle and Gardner; had five straight strikeouts; pitched four balls and retired the side in the seventh; allowed but two men to reach second base.
"It was the toughest game I ever lost," Johnson said. "But errors are part of baseball and I don't blame Milan."

BOSTON, Aug. 29.—Walter Johnson's second attempt of the present season to set up a new pitcher's record for successive victories failed Thursday when Boston won an 11-inning contest from Washington one to nothing.

For ten innings Johnson had disposed of Boston batsmen in a procession that was monotonous, except for the interest which his performance developed. Only in the second inning was the one, two, three order of Boston's going out interrupted, this by Yerkes' hit over short, until the 11th inning. Then Yerkes allowed the second hit off Johnson into center field, Milan fumbled, Moeller got in the way of his recovery and Yerkes was safe on third. Wagner's infield hit resulted in Yerkes being put out on the way to home, but not until Wagner had reached second. Manager Carrigan then hit between the left and center fielders, and Wagner rapped home for the winning run.

Up to Thursday the league's leading pitcher had twirled Washington to 14 victories without defeat, beginning on June 27, when Washington shut out Philadelphia 2 to 0. This stands as the American league record for this season, but is two games short of the mark set last season by Johnson and Wood the latter of Boston.

Thursday's game was an exhibition of Johnson's great pitching skill. In the eleven innings only thirty-five men faced him and but four of these reached a base. Only one man got to first base in the first nine innings. Ten Boston batsmen struck out, and Johnson, working like a machine, did not allow a base on balls.

The New York's got men on bases in every inning, but could score only in the eighth. The hitting of the lower end of the Philadelphia batting order featured.


