SAYS GIRL'S DEATH WAS DUE TO SHOCK

Physician Testifying in Taggart Murder Trial Claims Outward Signs Are Not Always Present.

NASHVILLE, Ind., Sept. 5.—The state finished the introduction of evidence against Hannibal Taggart on trial here for the alleged murder of her 16-year-old daughter Norma and rested late Thursday. The defense will begin its evidence Friday. The testimony Thursday was largely a repetition of that previously given except that it was the relatives who told of the treatment of the little girl by her father and uncle and aunt, Thomas Taggart and wife Ella. Mrs. Evaline Taggart, grandmother of the child, described her home life and declared Norma was a good child and that she was compelled to do all the house work at the Taggart home and took care of four smaller children. She had never seen any of the trio charged with Norma's murder, whip the child, the witness said. John Taggart, brother of two of the defendants, testified that he held Norma's hand when she died. The witness broken down and wept before he had finished his testimony. Fear and shock can cause a person's death and did bring about the death of Norma Taggart, Dr. W. E. Prather, coroner, asserted while on the witness stand Thursday afternoon. While no outward signs of such causes could be seen, the witness said, clogging of the blood resulted and this caused death. In answer to a long question Dr. Prather said a girl who had been punished severely and was fearful and nervous probably would die without outward signs violence. It is expected that all the evidence of the defense will be completed by Friday night.

SULZER IS URGED TO MAKE AN EXPLANATION

Former Pres. Roosevelt Advises Him to Answer the Charges Against Him—Governor is Silent.

ALBANY, N. Y., Sept. 5.—Col. Theodore Roosevelt has advised Gov. Sulzer to make a "full and straightforward explanation and answer in reference to the charges" that resulted in the governor's impeachment. In a letter replying to two communications relating to the gubernatorial situation sent by the governor to the former president, while he was traveling in the west, Col. Roosevelt says: "You owe it to yourself and to all those who have supported you to take the earliest opportunity to answer the charges made against you." Gov. Sulzer made the Roosevelt letter public today without comment. Asked if he would follow the former president's suggestion, the governor referred his interrogators to his general denial of the charges made by the Frawley committee, issued on the advice of his counsel on August 10, three days prior to the adoption of the impeachment resolution by the assembly. "My explanation will be given at the impeachment trial," the governor declared.

Col. Roosevelt's letter follows: "On my return from Arizona I have received your two letters. I thank you for them. I believe I thoroughly understand the assault that is now being made upon you. I have yet to meet a single person who believes or even pretends to believe that a single honest motive has animated the proceedings of your antagonists. From Mr. Murphy himself to the legislators who obeyed his directions, there is no possible question that all of your assailants are the enemies of the public, and that their aim is to acquire the evil domination of the state government and that the conspiracy against you has not one saving impulse behind it that can in the remotest degree be ascribed to patriotism or civic spirit or to anything save the basest impulse of crooked politics. We have never seen a more startling example of the power of the invisible government under the present system."
